

Jigsaw Method: Collaborative Learning Guide

Overview of the Jigsaw Method

The Jigsaw Method is a student-centered collaborative learning strategy that encourages peer teaching and deeper engagement with course content. Students will become "experts" on a specific topic before sharing their knowledge with their peers through a class presentation format. This method ensures that all students contribute to and benefit from a collaborative learning experience.

- 1. Collaborative learning and peer teaching
- 2. Critical thinking and analysis of complex topics
- 3. Engagement through inquiry
- 4. Application of knowledge through creative presentation formats

Step 1: Sign-Up and Independent Work

- Students will either sign up or be assigned to an Expert Group based on the topics provided by the teacher.
- Before meeting with their groups, students will independently read the assigned material and complete the guided reading questions.
- Each student must have completed the reading and answered the questions before meeting with their expert group to ensure productive discussions.
