male forgers and female copyists Copying a benign occupation when undertaken by a woman became forgery laden with criminal intent when performed by men Those who could successfully produce handle or detect spurious things and selves were distinguished from others who were incapable of distinguishing the authentic from the artistic and human forgeries Through close reading of literary narratives such as *Trilby* and *The Marble Faun* as well as newspaper accounts of forgery scandals *The Deceivers* reveals the identities both authentic and fake that emerged from the Victorian culture of forgery
