Becker, 2000 A bold new approach to language that addresses the subtleties of cultural identity **Individuality and Beyond** Benedetta Zavatta, 2019-07-05 Though few might think to connect the two figures Ralph Waldo Emerson was an important influence on Friedrich Nietzsche Specifically Emerson played a fundamental role in shaping Nietzsche's philosophical ideas on individualism perfectionism and the pursuit of virtue as well as his critiques of social conditioning religious dogmatism and anti natural morality With *Individuality and Beyond* Benedetta Zavatta offers the first philosophical interpretation of Emerson's influence on Nietzsche based on a sound philological analysis of previously unpublished materials from Nietzsche's private library Nietzsche's collection reveals numerous copies of Emerson's essays covered with annotations and marginalia as Nietzsche revisited these works throughout his life Through close reading Zavatta casts a new light on the ways in which Emerson's work informed Nietzsche's defining ideas of self creation the relation between fate and free will overcoming morality of customs and achieving moral autonomy and the transvaluation of such values as compassion and altruism Zavatta organizes these concepts into two main lines of thought the first concerns the development of the individual personality or the achievement of intellectual and moral autonomy and original self expression The second on the contrary concerns the overcoming of individuality and the need to transcend a limited view of the world by continually questioning one's own values and engaging with opposing perspectives Ultimately Zavatta clarifies the surprising contributions that Emerson made to 20th century European philosophy She provides a fresh portrait of Emerson as an American thinker long stereotyped as a naive idealist disinterested in the social issues of his day Seen through the eyes of Nietzsche his acute interpreter Emerson becomes an incisive cultural critic whose contributions underpin contemporary philosophy *Religion and Identity in South Asia and Beyond* Steven E. racial rhetoric that it did not create and which cannot serve it well Drawing together 18th and 19th century accommodationism and its assimilationist heirs with the movements of Black Power and Afrocentrism Anderson shows that all exhibit a similar structure of racial identity He suggests that it is time to move beyond the confines of the cult of black heroic genius to what Bell Hooks has termed postmodern blackness a racial discourse that leaves room to negotiate African American identities along lines of class gender sexuality and age as well as race

McClure, 2010-01-01 Despite astute critiques and available resources for alternative modes of thinking and practicing individualism continues to be a dominating and constraining ideology in the field of pastoral psychotherapy and counseling Philip Rieff was one of the first to highlight the negative implications of individualism in psychotherapeutic theories and practices As heirs and often enthusiasts of the Freudian tradition of which Rieff and others are critical pastoral theologians have felt the sting of his charge and yet the empirical research that McClure presents shows that pastoral counseling practitioners resist change Their attempts to overcome an individualistic perspective have been limited and ineffective because individualism is embedded in the field's dominant theological and theoretical resources practices and organizational arrangements Only a radical reappraisal of these will make possible pastoral counseling practices in a post individualistic mode McClure proposes several critical transformations broadening and deepening the operative theologies used to guide the healing practice expanding the role of the pastoral counselor reimagining the operative anthropology reclaiming sin and judgment nuancing the particular against the individual rethinking the ideal outcome of the practices and reimagining the organizational structures that support the practices Only this level of revisioning will enable this ministry of the church to move beyond its individualistic limitations and offer healing in more complex effective and socially adequate ways

Christian community in the region How should they re think their traditional view on theological subjects common to them and the Eastern Christian tradition Traditional Protestant attitudes towards Eastern Christianity which have been viewed through the lens of evangelicalism and mission have failed to grant the Protestants an influential and truly indigenous presence in the region and have led to them being constantly accused of being a foreign transplant and alien entity In the light of this it is clear that going beyond missiology and traditional evangelicalism demands re thinking certain mutually shared but contentious theological subjects from a new perspective with the focus on more constructive attempts to build fellowship through dialogue Finally the third question touches on the Protestants future in the Arab Muslim Middle East by viewing this inquiry from a broader perspective that is related to all the Middle Eastern Christian communities presence and role in the Muslim majority context It will discuss questions about the kind of presence and role that Christians Protestants included should hope to play in order to guarantee survival and a continuing presence in the region The question of identity formation and the managing of difference without trapping it in the mud of otherizing and self otherizing will also be tackled so that the theological dimension is integrated with the broader multifaceted contextual one

Beyond Party Mark Voss-Hubbard,2003-05-22 Captivating disgruntled voters third parties have often complicated the American political scene In the years before the Civil War third party politics took the form of the Know Nothings who mistrusted established parties and gave voice to anti government sentiment Originating about 1850 as a nativist fraternal order the Know Nothing movement soon spread throughout the industrial North In *Beyond Party* Mark Voss Hubbard draws on local sources in three different states where the movement was especially strong to uncover its social roots and establish its relationship to actual public policy issues Focusing on the 1852 ten hour movement in Essex County Massachusetts the pro temperance and anti Catholic agitation in and around Dauphin County Pennsylvania and the movement to restrict immigrants voting rights and overthrow corrupt parties and politicians in New London County Connecticut he shows that these places shared many of the social problems that occurred throughout the North the consolidation of capitalist agriculture and industry the arrival of Irish and German Catholic immigrants and the changing fortunes of many established political leaders Voss Hubbard applies the insights of social history and social movement theory to politics in arguing that we need to understand Know Nothing rhetoric and activism as part of a wider tradition of American suspicion of politics as usual even though of course this antipartyism served agendas that included those of self interested figures seeking to accumulate power
