Meglin, 2016-05-06 Dance is the art least susceptible to preservation since its embodied kinaesthetic nature has proven difficult to capture in notation and even in still or moving images However frameworks have been established and guidance made available for keeping dances performances and choreographers legacies alive so that the dancers of today and tomorrow can experience and learn from the dances and dancers of the past In this volume a range of voices address the issue of dance preservation through memory artistic choice interpretation imagery and notation as well as looking at relevant archives legal structures documentation and artefacts The intertwining of dance preservation and creativity is a core theme discussed throughout this text pointing to the essential continuity of dance history and dance innovation The demands of preservation stretch across time geographies institutions and interpersonal connections and this book focuses on the fascinating web that supports the fragile yet urgent effort to sustain our dancing heritage The articles in this book were originally published in the journal *Dance Chronicle Studies in Dance and the Related Arts*

(toward) a phenomenology of acting Phillip Zarrilli, 2019-09-12 In *toward a phenomenology of acting* Phillip Zarrilli considers acting as a question to be explored in the studio and then reflected upon. This book is a vital response to Jerzy Grotowski's essential question: How does the actor touch that which is untouchable? Phenomenology invites us to listen to the things themselves, to be attentive to how we sensorially, kinesthetically and affectively engage with acting as a phenomenon and process. Using detailed first person accounts of acting across a variety of dramaturgies and performances from Beckett to newly co-created performances to realism, it provides an account of how we do or practice phenomenology when training, performing, directing or teaching. Butoh, as Heard by a Dancer Dominique Savitri Bonarjee, 2023-10-31 This book explores the origins of Butoh in post war Japan through orality and transmission in conjunction with an embodied research approach The book is a gathering of seminal artistic voices Yoshito Ohno Natsu Nakajima Yukio Waguri Moe Yamamoto Masaki Iwana Ko Murobushi Yukio Suzuki Takao Kawaguchi Yuko Kaseki and the philosopher Kuniichi Uno These conversations happened during an extended research trip I made to Japan to understand the context and circumstances that engendered Butoh Alongside these exchanges are my reflections on Butoh s complex history These are primarily informed by my pedagogical and performance encounters with the artists I met during this time rather than a theoretical analysis Through the words of these dancers I investigate Butoh s tendency to evade categorization Butoh s artistic legacy of bodily rebellion plurality of authorship and fluidity of form seems prescient and feels more relevant in contemporary times than ever before This book is intended as a practitioner s guide for dancers artists students and scholars with an interest in non Western dance and dance history postmodern performance and Japanese arts and culture

*Radicals and Realists in the Japanese Nonverbal Arts* Thomas R. H. Havens, 2006-07-31 Radicals and Realists is the first book in any language to discuss Japan s avant garde artists their work and the historical environment in which they produced it during the two most creative decades of the twentieth century the 1950s and 1960s Many of the artists were radicals rebelling against existing canons and established authority Yet at the same time they were realists in choosing concrete materials sounds and themes from everyday life for their art and in gradually adopting tactics of protest or resistance through accommodation rather than confrontation Whatever the means of expression the production of art was never devoid of historical context or political implication Focusing on the nonverbal genres of painting sculpture dance choreography and music composition this work shows that generational and political differences not artistic doctrines largely account for the divergent stances artists took vis a vis modernism the international arts community Japan s ties to the United States and the alliance of corporate and bureaucratic interests that solidified in Japan during the 1960s After surveying censorship and arts policy during the American occupation of Japan 1945 1952 the narrative divides into two chronological sections dealing with the 1950s and 1960s bisected by the rise of an artistic underground in Shinjuku and the security treaty crisis of May 1960 The first section treats Japanese artists who studied abroad as well as the vast and varied experiments in each of the nonverbal avant garde arts that took place within Japan during the 1950s after long years of artistic insularity and near stasis throughout war and occupation Chief among the intellectuals who stimulated experimentation were the art critic Takiguchi Shuzo the painter Okamoto Taro and the businessman painter Yoshihara Jiro The second section addresses the multifront assault on formalism confusingly known as anti art led by visual artists nationwide Likewise composers of both Western style and contemporary Japanese style music increasingly chose everyday themes from folk music and the premodern musical repertoire for their new presentations Avant

garde print makers sculptors and choreographers similarly moved beyond the modern and modernism in their work A later chapter examines the artistic apex of the postwar period Osaka s 1970 world exposition where more avant garde music painting sculpture and dance were on display than at any other point in Japan s history before or since Radicals and Realists is based on extensive archival research numerous concerts performances and exhibits and exclusive interviews with more than fifty leading choreographers composers painters sculptors and critics active during those two innovative decades Its accessible prose and lucid analysis recommend it to a wide readership including those interested in modern Japanese art and culture as well as the history of the postwar years **Sensing and Making Sense** Grazielle Lautenschlaeger,2020-12-07
