

# SEMANTICS

Semantics is the branch of linguistics that deals with studying meaning in language. It examines the meaning of words, phrases, sentences, and language.

## OVERVIEW

Semantics looks at literal and implied meanings, the connotations words may carry, and how these meanings can change across different contexts. It also studies the relationships between words and phrases, like synonymy (words with the same or similar meanings), antonymy (words with opposite meanings), and polysemy (words or phrases with multiple, related meanings).

## EXAMPLE

**Interpreting Irony:** Irony refers to when someone says one thing but means another, often conveying implied criticism or sarcasm. For example, if someone says, "What a great day!" while standing in pouring rain, this would be ironic because it implies disappointment with the current situation despite saying otherwise through their words.
