DeMarco, 2016-08-19 In *Bioethics in Context* Gary Jones and Joseph DeMarco connect ethical theory medicine and the law guiding readers toward a practical and legally grounded understanding of key issues in health care ethics This book is uniquely up to date in its discussion of health care law and unpacks the complex web of American policies including the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act Useful case studies and examples are embedded throughout and a companion website offers a thorough curated database of relevant legal precedents as well as additional case studies and other resources *Data Needs for the State Children's Health Insurance Program* National Research Council, Division of Behavioral and Social Sciences and Education, Committee on National Statistics, Panel for the Workshop on the State Children's Health Insurance Program, 2002-06-26 The State Children's Health Insurance Program SCHIP was established by Congress to provide health insurance to uninsured children whose family income was too high for Medicaid coverage but too low to allow the family to obtain private health insurance coverage The enabling legislation for SCHIP included in the Balanced Budget Act of 1997 made available to states and the District of Columbia almost 40 billion over a 10 year period for this program Like Medicaid SCHIP is a joint federal state program with funding from both sources but it is implemented by the states Thus there are SCHIP programs in all of the states and the District of Columbia The National Research Council through the Committee on National Statistics was asked to explore some of the ways in which data analysis could be used to promote achievement of the SCHIP goal of expanding health insurance coverage for uninsured children from low income families To inform its work the panel for this project held a workshop to bring together state SCHIP officials and researchers to share findings and methods that would inform the design implementation and evaluation of SCHIP at the state and national levels In keeping with this charge this report is limited to discussions at the workshop It does not attempt to provide a summary of all the state programs nor a comprehensive review of the literature *Data Needs for the State Children's Health Insurance Program* concludes that data are insufficient in the individual states to provide a clear picture of the impact of SCHIP on the number of children who are eligible for the program the rate at which eligible children are enrolled in the program and the rate at which they are retained in the program once enrolled This situation is due in part to the fact that sample sizes in national surveys are too small to provide detailed data for individual states In addition the great amount of movement of children among health

insurance categories Medicaid SCHIP private insurance or no insurance at all makes it difficult for states to count the number of children in specific categories at a particular point in time The panel specifies a number of practices that could be implemented to improve the overall functioning of SCHIP and the ability of policy makers to evaluate the program Foremost among these are 1 developing more uniform ways of estimating eligibility and health insurance coverage among the states 2 sharing among the states effective methods for outreach 3 taking qualitative information into account in addition to quantitative information in assessing variation among states in enrollment and disenrollment and 4 implementing longitudinal studies to track the movement of children among the various insurance statuses

Take Me to Paris, Johnny
 John Foster, 2016-05-02 Take Me to Paris Johnny is John Foster's moving yet unsentimental account of the life of his partner Juan C. Spedes. It traces Juan's youth in Cuba and his move to New York where he struggles to make it as a dancer. There in 1981 in a chance encounter much like any other he meets John an Australian historian. What begins as just a fling becomes a dazzling six year affair. The two travel between New York Berlin and Melbourne struggling with bureaucracy in their quest to gain Juan residency in Australia then with the disease taking the lives of gay men around the globe. To the end Juan an exotic bird the only one of his kind in Melbourne is captivating witty headstrong. First published in 1993 not long before John Foster's death Take Me to Paris Johnny is brilliant and unflinching at once controlled and impassioned a love story told with humour and unerring skill. This edition includes an introduction by Peter Craven and an expanded biographical portrait of the author by John Rickard. John Foster was born in Melbourne in 1944. He studied at the University of Melbourne then in Germany and the United Kingdom. In 1971 he returned to the University of Melbourne where for many years he lectured in the Department of History. He edited the collections Community of Fate Memoirs of German Jews in Melbourne 1986 and Victorian Picturesque The Colonial Gardens of William Sangster 1989. Take Me to Paris Johnny was Foster's tribute to his lover Juan C. Spedes a Cuban dancer who died of AIDS in 1987. The memoir was published in 1993 and shortlisted for the Age Book of the Year award within a year John Foster himself was dead. A literary masterpiece Unparalleled in Australian letters. The Beauties and Furies Christina Stead, 2016-10-03 It is 1934 and Elvira Western has left London and her dull marriage to Paul a doctor for Paris and her waiting lover Oliver a student radical But drab hotels and interminable discussions of politics are not her idea of romance and soon Elvira is wishing she could leave the city of many beauties and furies and return home Christina Stead's second novel dramatises a love triangle against a backdrop of political upheaval Its publication in 1936 prompted a writer for the *New Yorker* to call Stead the most extraordinary woman novelist since Virginia Woolf Christina Stead was born in 1902 in Sydney Stead's first books *The Salzburg Tales* and *Seven Poor Men of Sydney* were published in 1934 to positive reviews in England and the United States Her fourth work *The Man Who Loved Children* has been hailed as a masterpiece by Jonathan Franzen among others In total Stead wrote almost twenty novels and short story collections Stead returned to Australia in 1969 after forty years abroad for a fellowship at the Australian National University She resettled permanently in Australia in 1974 and was the first recipient of the Patrick White Award that year Christina Stead died in Sydney in 1983 aged eighty She is widely considered to be one of the most influential Australian authors of the twentieth century Stead is of that category of fiction
