Simpson, 2025-05-06 The new paperback edition of this excellent illustrated history includes additional information about recent developments up to 2025 The Kelowna Story is a comprehensive full length history of the largest metropolitan centre outside BC's Lower Mainland a labour of love by a leading local historian whose family roots have been entwined with Kelowna's for five generations It embraces the full sweep of central Okanagan history starting with the days of the Sookanhkchinx who enjoyed a largely peaceful existence along the shores of the lakes and rivers before the earliest explorers came to trade followed by Father Pandosy and his Okanagan Mission in 1859 It was the mission that attracted Kelowna's first homesteaders soon followed by cattle ranchers and orchardists and much later by the empire builders like the Bennett family who paved the way for today's budding metropolis Author Sharron J Simpson believes history is best told through the stories of ordinary people while allowing today's readers may not think it ordinary to walk over mountain ranges to collect mail or consider it ordinary to climb into a narrow irrigation pipe to scrape the rust off the inside as it runs up and down the hillsides or to row freight from one end of Okanagan Lake to the other In their time she writes those who did extraordinary things were simply doing what needed to be done to get ahead Their stories are fascinating and tell of the remarkable investment early settlers made in this community Simpson tells the story of her hometown with an attention to detail and a passion for narrative that bespeaks her own considerable talent and deep commitment

Vancouver & Beyond Fred Thirkell,2000 An anthology of 50 stories about Vancouver and environs in the early years of the 20th century These stories grew out of a collection of picture postcards not just any old postcards but particularly appealing real photo cards that seemed to be waiting to have their stories told While some of the images are not uncommon most of the pictures are rare if not one of a kind survivors of the golden age of postcards which encompassed the years between 1900 and 1914 the relatively short period of time when Vancouver ended its days as a frontier town and became a significant Canadian city

Brushed by Cedar, Living by the River Crisca Bierwert,2019-11-01 A brilliant experimental ethnography Brushed by Cedar is destined to change the way anthropologists write about the people they befriend Crisca Bierwert has created a fresh poststructural ethnography that offers new insights into Coast Salish cultures Arguing against the existence of a master narrative she presents her understanding of these Native American peoples of Washington state and British Columbia Canada through poetic bricolage offering the reader a pastiche of rich cultural images Bierwert employs postmodern literary and social analyses to examine many aspects of Salish culture legends and their storytellers domestic violence longhouse ceremonies the importance and power of place and disputes over fishing rights Her reflections overlap as a dialogue would weaving throughout the book significant threads of Salish knowledge and creating a nonauthoritative text that nonetheless speaks knowingly This book represents the future of contemporary anthropology Unlike traditional ethnography it makes no attempt to portray a complete picture of the Coast Salish Instead Bierwert utilizes a critical and diffuse approach that defies colonial syncretic and hegemonic structures and applies advanced literary theory to the creation of ethnography Brushed by Cedar is an important guideline for anyone who writes about other cultures and will be expecially useful to classes in the methodology and history of ethnography as well as to scholars specializing in Native American studies or oral literatures
