The Interaction of Modality and Negation Ferdinand De Haan, 2013-10-31 First Published in 1997 This book is an updated version of the author's 1994 dissertation submitted to the Graduate School of the University of Southern California With updated references footnotes pointing to research published after May 1994 this study of modality showcases its long history Yet for many centuries it seemed to be the exclusive domain of philosophers It was not recognized by linguists as a separate object for study until comparatively recent times The author argues that the other component of this study negation has fared much better

Modality, Aspect and Negation in Persian Azita Hojatollah Taleghani, 2008 This monograph presents a morpho syntactic investigation on modality aspect and negation by concentrating on Persian and is designed to contribute to theoretical linguistics and the study of Iranian languages The analysis is based on the Minimalist program This research challenges the idea that the syntactic structure maps on the semantic interpretation or vice versa The discussion presented in this monograph shows that the syntactic structure of Persian modals is uniform no matter if the modals are interpreted as having root or epistemic readings Although it is claimed that modals are raising constructions in different languages modals in Persian which does not have subject raising constructions show a different syntactic behavior Furthermore the structural analysis of the interaction of Persian modals and negation shows that because of the scope interaction of negation and modals the syntactic structure of modals with respect to negation mostly corresponds to the semantic interpretation of modals

It particularly argues for a multi locus analysis with syntactic semantic morphosyntactic and diachronic implications for the various structural positions. Thus accounting for numerous word order restrictions semantic ambiguities and pragmatic interpretations without complicating narrow syntax with special operations configurations or constraints

Modality and Ellipsis Remus Gergel, 2009-03-26 Aspects of modality and ellipsis have become prominent in theoretical linguistics over the last years. What has remained under investigated is the fact that modals tend to make excellent ellipsis licensors and conversely that many of the naturally occurring cases of ellipsis are licensed by modals. The book concentrates on the syntax of the modal auxiliaries with special focus on English and investigates the grammatical relationship with the process of ellipsis that interacts most relevantly with the modals in grammaticalized fashion by including a special emphasis on verb phrase ellipsis. After a critical discussion of pertinent approaches in the two domains the book focuses on establishing the connection between the two areas by essentially drawing on the history of English and on observable effects in modern grammars which it puts into perspective with semantically grounded features on the modals involved. Two major generalizations are proposed in the monograph. The first generalization concerns the treatment of the interaction between modals and ellipsis as determined by the features located in the licensing modal heads. To this end the syntactic effects of the main semantic factors are explored in detail in English and partial effects obtaining in other languages are discussed. The second generalization concerns the syntactic component involved in ellipsis licensing. It is suggested that ellipsis types with the distributional features of verb phrase ellipsis are licensed by interpretable features of the licensing head. The two

generalizations are intertwined with one another and derive a series of further legitimate ellipsis licensors beyond the modals.
