*Knowledge and Practical Interests* Jason Stanley, 2005-10-20 Jason Stanley presents a startling and provocative claim about knowledge that whether or not someone knows a proposition at a given time is in part determined by his or her practical interests i.e. by how much is at stake for that person at that time. So whether a true belief is knowledge is not merely a matter of supporting beliefs or reliability in the case of knowledge. Practical rationality and theoretical rationality are intertwined. Stanley defends this thesis against alternative accounts of the phenomena that motivate it such as the claim that knowledge attributions are linguistically context sensitive contextualism about knowledge attributions and the claim that the truth of a knowledge claim is somehow relative to the person making the claim relativism about knowledge. In the course of his argument Stanley introduces readers to a number of strategies for resolving philosophical paradox making the book essential not just for specialists in epistemology but for all philosophers interested in philosophical methodology. In this book the author argues for a groundbreaking perspective that knowledge is inherently interest relative. This means that what one knows is influenced not just by belief, evidence and truth but crucially by the purposes those beliefs serve. Drawing from classical Nyāya epistemologies the book asserts that knowledge rationalizes action if you know something it is sensible to act on it and the best way to square this with an anti-sceptical epistemology is to say that knowledge is interest relative. While versions of this view have been debated they haven't gained wide acceptance. The author addresses common objections with a refined formulation and explores how this perspective elucidates the role of knowledge in inquiry, daily life and the history of thought. Key distinctions include the impact of long odds situations on knowledge, the distinctive role knowledge has as a starting point for inquiry and the importance of using non-ideal models in theorising about knowledge. Building on decades of scholarship the author offers a cohesive theory that integrates and clarifies previous works demonstrating that not only knowledge but

The author approaches the work of students in school as a labor process in the context of an advanced capitalist society. He describes such typical junior high activities as goofing off and bugging the teacher by examining the meaning of these activities to the students engaged in them and brings acute observation and sensitivity to bear on the forms of resistance that arise among the students showing that this resistance is a form of power which students exercise in the face of their estranged status. Ángel Pinillos, 2023 This book is an attempt to investigate an important set of philosophical and practical problems related to skeptical doubt from the perspective of human cognition an area where there has been quite a bit of progress in the past 50 years The road will take us to some unexpected places For example I will argue that the capacity which draws us to philosophical skepticism serves a human rational function which is to weed out hasty reasoning in our everyday life The capacity also seems to play a role in creative outside the box thinking conspiratorial thought and even in some mental health illnesses such as obsessive compulsive disorder Finally our approach will allow us to develop a philosophical response to the skeptical challenge A key to this argument will be to show that our inclinations toward skeptical doubt have a certain logic to them which has an identifiable flaw We exploit this flaw to answer the skeptic We will get to these points in this introduction and in the book but we first need to clarify some terminology
