# DISCOURSE ANALYSIS

Discourse analysis is an approach to the study of language that demonstrates how language shapes reality and reveal dominant ways of thinking an acting.

### OVERVIEW

Discourse analysis involves the examination of how the 'ways of speaking about things' normalizes and privileges some frames of thinking about things while marginalizing others. As a simple example, if movies consistently frame the ideal female as passive, silent, and submissive, then this becomes normalized in the "dominant discourse" of gender.

## EXAMPLE

Studying Government Policies: A discourse analysis of policy texts would involve looking at the keywords, metaphors, and phrases used in the text and how they reveal ideological frameworks and viewpoints of the government of the day. These sorts of studies often demonstrate how the language of policy texts normalizes some behaviors and marginalizes others.
