*Experiencing and Explaining Disease* Basiro Davey, Clive Seale, 1996 *Experiencing and Explaining Disease* examines the different accounts of disease causation produced by research in epidemiology biology and sociology and the different meanings attached to states of illness by doctors patients and the media It explores the ways in which prevailing social norms affect the status of the sick person and seeks explanations for the stigmatisation that discriminates against people with certain conditions while others are considered innocent victims of disease These themes are developed in five case studies of highly contrasting conditions rheumatoid arthritis HIV and AIDS asthma schizophrenia and chronic pain These case studies illustrate the complex difficulties for lay people and professionals in explaining and managing the disease and the physical social and emotional dimensions of the illness experience This book will be an invaluable text for students of health studies social work social policy the social sciences medicine nursing and other health professionals and for a wide range of lay people including patients and carers

**Experiencing Pain in Imperial Greek Culture** Daniel King, 2018 This volume investigates the history and nature of pain in Greek culture under the Roman Empire 50 250 CE Traditional accounts of pain in this society have focused either on philosophical or medical theories of pain or on Christian notions of suffering fascination with the pained body has often been assumed to be a characteristic of Christian society rather than Imperial culture in general This book employs tools from contemporary cultural and literary theory to examine the treatment of pain in a range of central cultural discourses from the first three centuries of the Empire including medicine religious writing novelistic literature and rhetorical ekphrasis It argues instead that pain was approached from an holistic perspective rather than treating pain as a narrowly defined physiological perception it was conceived as a type of

embodied experience in which ideas about the body's physiology the representation and articulation of its perceptions as well as the emotional and cognitive impact of pain were all important facets of what it meant to be in pain By bringing this conception to light scholars are able to redefine our understanding of the social and emotional fabric of Imperial society and help to reposition its relationship with the emergence of Christian society in late antiquity

**Thinking Through Cultures** Richard A. Shweder, 1991 A discipline is emerging called cultural psychology it will serve as a force of renewal for both anthropology and psychology In this book Richard Shweder presents its manifesto Its central theme is that we have to understand the way persons cultures and natures make each other up Its goal is to seek the mind indissociably embedded in the meanings and resonances that are both its product and its components Over the past thirty years the person as a category has disappeared from ethnography Shweder aims to reverse this trend focusing on the search for meaning and the creation of intentional worlds He examines the prospect for a reconciliation of rationality and relativism and defines an intellectual agenda for cultural psychology What Shweder calls for is an exploration of the human mind and of one's own mind by thinking through the ideas and practices of
