**Hannah Arendt's Ethics** Deirdre Lauren Mahony, 2018-06-28 The vast majority of studies of Hannah Arendt's thought are concerned with her as a political theorist This book offers a contribution to rectifying this imbalance by providing a critical engagement with Arendtian ethics Arendt asserts that the crimes of the Holocaust revealed a shift in ethics and the need for new responses to a new kind of evil In this new treatment of her work Arendt's best known ethical concepts the notion of the banality of evil and the link she posits between thoughtlessness and evil both inspired by her study of Adolf Eichmann are disassembled and appraised The concept of the banality of evil captures something tangible about modern evil yet requires further evaluation in order to assess its implications for understanding contemporary evil and what it means for traditional moral philosophical issues such as responsibility blame and punishment In addition this account of Arendt's ethics reveals two strands of her thought not previously considered her idea that the condition of living with oneself can represent a barrier to evil and her account of the nonparticipants who refused to be complicit in the crimes of the Nazi period and their defining moral features This exploration draws out the most salient aspects of Hannah Arendt's ethics provides a critical review of the more philosophically problematic elements and places Arendt's work in this area in a broader moral philosophy context examining the issues in moral philosophy which are raised in her work such as the relevance of intention for moral responsibility and of thinking for good moral conduct and questions of character integrity and moral incapacity

**The Ascetic Ideal** Stephen Mulhall, 2021-08-12. In *The Ascetic Ideal*, Stephen Mulhall shows how areas of cultural life that seem to be either essentially unconnected to evaluative commitments—science and philosophy or to involve non-moral values—aesthetics—are in fact deeply informed by ethico-religious commitments for better and for worse. The book develops a reading of Nietzsche's concept of the ascetic ideal which he used to track the evolution, mutation, and expansion of the system of slave moral values associated primarily with Judaeo-Christian religious belief through diverse fields of Western European culture, not just religion and morality but aesthetics, science, and philosophy. Mulhall also offers an interpretation of Nietzsche's genealogical method that aims to rebut standard criticisms of its nature and to emphasize its potential for enhancing philosophical understanding more generally. The focus throughout is on developments in those fields which occurred after the end of Nietzsche's intellectual career and in particular on influential modes of thought and practice that have a contemporary significance. The goal is not simply to argue that Nietzsche's diagnosis and critique retains considerable merit but also to show that Nietzsche is himself significantly indebted to the ideals he criticizes and that this opens up a possibility of synthesizing elements of his approach with those drawn from its target. Hence the book also tracks various ways in which the object of Nietzsche's criticism has undergone further mutations just as his genealogical method would suggest and in doing so has generated ways of pursuing the values central to asceticism that avoid Nietzsche's criticisms and might even further his own goals.

the annus mirabilis of modernism alongside Joyce's *Ulysses*, Eliot's *The Waste Land*, Mansfield's *The Garden Party* and Woolf's *Jacob's Room*. Bertolt Brecht's first play to be produced, *Drums in the Night*, was first staged in 1922 as was Jean Cocteau's *Antigone* with settings by Pablo Picasso and music by Arthur Honegger. In different ways, all these modernist landmarks dealt with the crisis of representation and the demise of eternal metaphysical and ethical truths. In his later philosophy, Wittgenstein adopted a novel philosophical attitude sensitive to the ordinary uses of language as well as to the unnoticed dogmas they may betray. If the gist of modernism is self-reflection and attention to the way form expresses content, then Wittgenstein's later ideas, in their fragmented form as well as their ear-opening contents, deliver it most precisely. Understanding Wittgenstein: Understanding Modernism shows Wittgenstein's work, both early and late, to be closely linked to the modernist *Geist* that prevailed during his lifetime. Yet it would be wrong to argue that Wittgenstein was a modernist tout court. For Wittgenstein, as well as for modernist art, understanding is not gained by such straightforward statements. It needs time, hesitation, a variety of articulations, the refusal of tempting solutions and perhaps even a sense of defeat. It is such a vision of the linkage between Wittgenstein and modernism that guides the present volume.
