Cowan, 2016-03-02 In this history of right wing politics in Brazil during the Cold War Benjamin Cowan puts the spotlight on the Cold Warriors themselves Drawing on little tapped archival records he shows that by midcentury conservatives individuals and organizations civilian as well as military were firmly situated in a transnational network of right wing cultural activists They subsequently joined the powerful hardline constituency supporting Brazil's brutal military dictatorship from 1964 to 1985 There they lent their weight to a dictatorship that Cowan argues operationalized a moral panic that conflated
