

PROMOTING PERSON-FIRST and NEURODIVERGENT LANGUAGE in CLINICAL INTERACTIONS



DEFINITIONS:

Person-first language:

Describing someone by their name/ pronoun with a carrier phrase and then their disability/challenge.
Example: Sean is a child with autism.

Identity-first language:

Description of a person that first introduces their disability.
Example: Sean is an autistic child.

Neurodivergent:

Differing mental or neurological traits that are not considered mainstream or typical. Example: Someone with autism who doesn't make eye contact during conversations.

Note: There is a shifting perspective on identity-first vs. person-first language in many disability communities at this time. When in doubt about what a person prefers, just ask, if possible! Example: Do you prefer person-first language or identity-first language?

IMPACT ON PEDIATRIC PATIENTS:

Goal Writing:

- Goals should align with personal and family system needs. When possible, have the child help write their goals.
- Goals should reflect who they are as a person with their own determination in the world.
- We should shift away from lots of goals around how to have a conversation or "rule"-based teaching of conversational skills like "eye contact."
- Work on conversational repair/advocacy strategies with neurodivergent patients.
 - Sean will utilize identity/person-first language to introduce himself with new conversation partners.
 - Sean will recognize communication partner confusion with his communication style and advocate for himself within conversation to maintain conversational flow.

Representation:

- Have books/materials/media in your space and during sessions that are representative of disability and neurodivergence.
- When possible, have groups or offer to connect your patient and their support systems with similar peers.
- Encourage inclusion/integration with peer activities, but recognize when time and space are needed for patients to explore their unique needs and styles.
- When age-appropriate, build up self-esteem and self-advocacy in activities.

Conversations with Caregivers:

- As often as possible, acknowledge and name the disability with families.
- Avoid using words like "cure" or other words that assign a negative connotation to the reason the child is in speech therapy.
- Encourage use of discussing their disability or challenge with and/or statements instead of but/not statements.
 - Sean has autism and loves to play sports instead of Sean has autism, but can still play sports.
 - Sean is non-verbal and communicates via his device instead of Sean cannot talk, but has a device.
