While its short history has been the subject of quite a few studies published in recent years, the current book focuses instead on its very long past. In historical retrospect, such conceptual transitions, seemingly sudden and unannounced, are typically foreshadowed in the course of enduring research programs that serve as slowly developing theoretical constraint structures gradually narrowing down the apparent solution space for the scientific problems at hand. Ultimately, the fundamental problem is either resolved to the satisfaction of the majority of researchers in the area of investigation or else, and much more commonly, one or more of the major theoretical constraints is abandoned or radically modified, giving way to entirely new theoretical vistas.
