Pullum, 2012-12-06 The work collected in this book represents the results of some intensive recent work on the syntax of natural languages. The authors differing viewpoints have in common the program of revising current conceptions of syntactic representation so that the role of transformational derivations is reduced or eliminated. The fact that the papers cross refer to each other a good deal and that authors assuming quite different fram works are aware of each other s results and address themselves to shared problems is partly the result of a conference on the nature of syntactic representation that was held at Brown University in May 1979 with the express purpose of bringing together different lines of research in syntax The papers in this volume mostly arise out of work that was presented in preliminary form at that conference though much rewriting and further research has been done in the interim period Two papers are included because although they were not given even in preliminary form at the conference it has become clear since then that they interrelate with the work of the conference so much that they cannot reasonably be left out Gerald Gazdar's statement of his program for phrase structure description of natural language forms the theoretical basis that is assumed by Maling and Zaenen and by Sag and David Dowty's paper represents a bridge between the relational grammar exemplified here in the papers by Perlmutter and Postal on the one hand Syntax Robert D. The Syntax of Norwegian Passive Constructions Tor A. Åfarlí,1992-11-06 This book provides an analysis of the passive phenomenon in general and of Norwegian passive constructions in particular Related topics such as English passive constructions and Norwegian ergative constructions are also examined The analysis is carried out within a Government and Binding framework Chapter 1 contains a very brief introduction to GB syntax and a description of the passive phenomenon and its manifestation in Norwegian The orthodox analysis of the passive as proposed in Chomsky s Lectures on Government and Binding is contrasted with the new analysis which claims that the passive morpheme is an argument of the verb The book sets out to show that a version of this new analysis successfully explains the basic properties of Norwegian passives Chapters 2 and 3 examine properties of Norwegian passives notably properties related to Theta role assignment and Case assignment Chapter 4 compares the Norwegian with the English passive and proposes a unified analysis of the two Chapter 5 discusses various cases of passivization failure in Norwegian while Chapter 6 focuses on the scope of movement in passive and ergative constructions in Norwegian and proposes a syntactic level beneath D structure

This important new research based on a data base of more than 600 languages not only investigates fully the richness and variety of causative types but also presents an alternative perspective to the traditional typological approach The new typology enables a better understanding of how the human mind cognizes causation and how this is reflected in language Causatives and Causation is also an important attempt to integrate language typology with diachrony by constructing a diachronic model of causative affixes on the basis of this new typology Drawing on the theoretical insight of Role and Reference Grammar this book provides a case study of the causative constructions in Korean providing additional support for both the proposed new typology and the diachronic model It also examines the pragmatic foundations of causatives an important but previously unexplored area of study Language in Context Jason Stanley, 2007 Natural languages all contain constructions the interpretation of which depends upon the situation in which they are used In Language and Context Jason Stanley presents a series of essays which develop a theory of how the situation in which we speak interacts with the words we use to help produce what we say The reason we can so smoothly operate with sentences that can be used to express very different items of information Stanley argues is that there are linguistically mandated constraints on the effects of the situation on what we say These linguistically mandated constraints are most evident in the cases of sentences containing explicit pronouns such as She is a mathematician where interpretation of the information expressed is guided by the use of the pronoun she But even when such explicit pronouns are lacking our sentences provide similar cues to allow our interlocutors to determine the information expressed We are in the main confident that our interlocutors will smoothly grasp what we say because the grammar and meaning of our sentences encodes these constraints In defending this theory Stanley pays close attention to specific cases of context sensitive constructions such as quantified noun phrases comparative adjectives and conditionals Philosophers and cognitive scientist have appealed to the dependence of what is intuitively said by a sentence on the situation in which it is uttered to argue against the possibility of a systematic

theory of meaning for natural language The theory developed in this book is a vigorous defense of the possibility of a systematic theory of meaning for natural language against these influential tendencies

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
