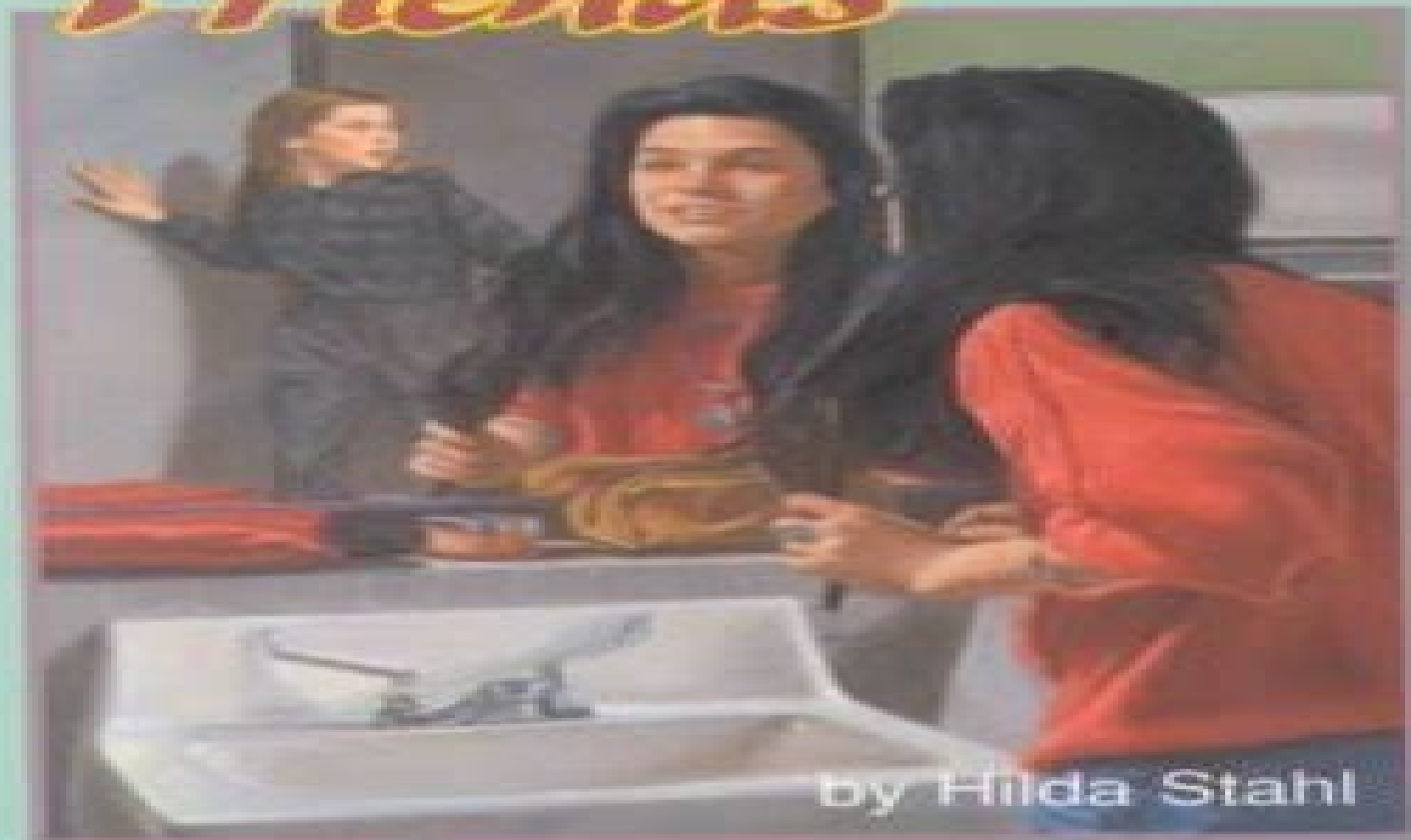

Roberson,2025-05-01 Travel writing was the most popular genre of writing in the nineteenth century Initially published in newspapers and journals as dispatches from the road these works allowed readers to join in on fabulous adventures by becoming armchair tourists second hand voyeurs of the peoples and places the writer visited In order to take readers along on their journeys travel writers typically recorded miles covered and dates of travel in a log or diary They also documented key details of the experience itself describing the conditions of the road the people they met and their accommodations food and clothing The nineteenth century specifically offered a form of travel writing that commented on the ruined environment that ran afoul of the century s ethos of progress with voices such as Henry David Thoreau John Muir and John James Audubon exploring a newfound environmental consciousness *Geographies of Travel* is organized geographically by region with essays examining local journeys in the Northeast Midwest Far West and the South This regional arrangement allows readers to consider the geographic imagination of each region and the kinds of travel it invited as well as providing valuable insight on the ways in which Americans reacted to both natural and social regional landscapes Each region is treated chronologically so as to interrogate not only individual narratives but also the ways that travel tourism and modes of transportation evolved over time The work concludes with an examination of Henry James s *The American Scene* in a coda that brings together his astute observations of the Northeast and the South at the turn of the century Occasional interludes point to the ways that travel reverberates in the artistic work of some of the authors making connections between travel and the imagination Wonder Show Hannah Rodgers Barnaby,2012 Barnaby delivers a striking historical fiction YA debut about a wayward girl amid the freaks and sideshows of a late 1930 s traveling circus Religion and Women in Britain, c. 1660-1760 Sarah Apetrei,2016-04-08 The essays contained in this volume examine the

Arms Justin Iverson, 2022-11-01 Enslaved Black people took up arms and fought in nearly every colonial conflict in early British North America They sometimes served as loyal soldiers to protect and promote their owners interests in the hope that they might be freed or be rewarded for their service But for many Black combatants war and armed conflict offered an opportunity to attack the chattel slave system itself and promote Black emancipation and freedom In six cases starting in 1676 with Nathaniel Bacon's Rebellion in Virginia and ending in 1865 with the First South Carolina Volunteer Infantry Regiment near Charleston Rebels in Arms tells the long story of how enslaved soldiers and Maroons learned how to use military service and armed conflict to fight for their own interests Justin Iverson details a different conflict in each chapter illuminating the participation of Black soldiers Using a comparative Atlantic analysis that uncovers new perspectives on major military conflicts in British North American history he reveals how enslaved people used these conflicts to lay the groundwork for abolition in 1865 Over the nearly two hundred year history of these struggles enslaved resistance in the British Atlantic world became increasingly militarized and enslaved soldiers Maroons and plantation rebels together

increasingly relied on military institutions and operations to achieve their goals

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
