Welsh, Peter Lev, 2007 From examinations of Francis Ford Coppola's *Apocalypse Now* to Alfred Hitchcock's *Vertigo* *The Literature Film Reader Issues of Adaptation* covers a wide range of films adapted from other sources The first section presents essays on the hows and whys of adaptation studies and subsequent sections highlight films adapted from a variety of sources including classic and popular literature drama biography and memoir The last section offers a new departure for adaptation studies suggesting that films about history often a separate category of film study can be seen as adaptations of records of the past The anthology concludes with speculations about the future of adaptation studies Several essays provide detailed analyses of films in some cases discussing more than one adaptation of a literary or dramatic source such as *The Manchurian Candidate* *The Quiet American* and *Romeo and Juliet* Other works examined include *Moby Dick* *The House of Mirth* *Dracula* and *Starship Troopers* demonstrating the breadth of material considered for this anthology Although many of the essays appeared in *Literature Film Quarterly* more than half are original contributions Chosen for their readability these essays avoid theoretical jargon as much as possible For this reason alone this collection should be of interest to not only cinema scholars but to anyone interested in films and their source material Ultimately *The Literature Film Reader Issues of Adaptation* provides an excellent overview of this critical aspect of film studies **The Gangster Film Reader** Alain Silver, James Ursini, 2007-02 In the 1930s the gangster film in the United States coincided with a very real and very sensational gangsterism at large in American society *Little Caesar* 1931 *The Public Enemy* 1931 and *Scarface* 1932 borrowed liberally from the newspapers and books of the era With the release of just these three motion pictures in barely more than a year's time Hollywood quintessentially defined the genre The characters the situations and the icons from fast cars and tommy guns to fancy fedoras and fancier molls established the audience expectations associated with the gangster film that remain in force to this day As with their *Film Noir Reader* series using both reprints of seminal articles and new pieces editors Silver and Ursini have assembled a group of essays that presents an exhaustive overview of this still vital genre Reprints of work by such well known film historians as Robin Wood Andrew Sarris Carlos Clarens Paul Schrader and Stuart Kaminsky explore the evolution of the gangster film through the 1970s and *The Godfather* Parts 2 and 3 comprise two dozen newer articles most of them written expressly for this volume by Ursini and Silver These case studies and thematic analyses from *White Heat* to the remake of *Scarface* to *The Sopranos* complete the anthology **Richard III: A Critical Reader** Annaliese Connolly, 2013-10-24 Charting the ruthless rise and fall of the villainous king *Richard III* remains one of Shakespeare's most enduringly discussed and oft performed plays Assembled by leading scholars this guide provides a

Redmon,2022-08-24 Rewatching on the Point of the Cinematic Index offers a reassessment of the cinematic index as it sits at the intersection of film studies trauma studies and adaptation studies Author Allen H Redmon argues that far too often scholars imagine the cinematic index to be nothing more than an acknowledgment that the lens based camera captures and brings to the screen a reality that existed before the camera When cinema s indexicality is so narrowly defined the entire nature of film is called into question the moment film no longer relies on a lens based camera The presence of digital technologies seemingly strips cinema of its indexical standing This volume pushes for a broader understanding of the cinematic index by returning to the early discussions of the index in film studies and the more recent discussions of the index in other digital arts Bolstered by the insights these discussions can offer the volume looks to replace what might be best deemed a diminished concept of the cinematic index with a series of more complex cinematic indices the impoverished index the indefinite index the intertextual index and the imaginative index The central argument of this book is that these more complex indices encourage spectators to enter a process of ongoing adaptation of the reality they see on the screen and that it is on the point of these indices that the most significant instances of rewatching movies occur Examining such films as John Lee Hancock s Saving Mr Banks 2013 Richard Linklater s oeuvre Paul Greengrass s United 93 2006 Oliver Stone s World Trade Center 2006 Stephen Daldry s Extremely Loud and Incredibly Close 2011 and Christopher Nolan s Dunkirk 2017 Inception 2010 and Memento 2000 Redmon demonstrates that the cinematic index invites spectators to enter a process of ongoing adaptation

Religion and Film Stefanie Knauss,2020-01-29 Is cinema evil or sacramental Can films make theological contributions Can film viewing be a religious practice How do films values and power interact The study of film and religion engages a range of diverse questions through different approaches and methods In this contribution I distinguish three complementary approaches In the first part I discuss those that focus on the film as text the representation of religion in film and how theology happens in film The next section will broaden this perspective by taking into consideration how films affect audiences and how the

relationship between film and audience might have religious dimensions or serve religious functions In the third part attention to the text and the audience are combined with the consideration of both film and religion as agents in cultural processes in order to think about how film and religion are shaped by and shape value systems and ideologies In the last section I will begin to tackle the difficult question of theory and method I consciously postpone this part until the end because in many cases methodologies and theoretical frameworks are implied in and emerge from concrete case studies rather than being consciously reflected upon This final section has two goals it will make explicit some of these underlying assumptions to serve as a starting point for a more sustained reflection on the theories and methodologies of the field and it will highlight some of the pitfalls we encounter if we are not methodologically and theoretically precise in our work
