she envisions pastoral care first as a rhythm of the life of the whole church and secondarily as a work of trained pastors. In her vision, pastoral care is rescued from a narrow understanding of it as exceptional acts of intervention performed only in moments of dire crisis. Instead, it becomes a daily practice of pastoral care: attending in love to the stories of others and listening for ways God is already present in a life story. Solidly theological, grounded in the life of the church and eminently teachable, Karen Scheib has given us a great gift in this book.
