It limits itself to material within the experience of today's general readers avoiding for instance academic historical writing and treatises on technique. Its earliest subjects are those nineteenth century works and choreographers that still resonate with dance lovers today: Giselle, The Sleeping Beauty, Swan Lake, Bournonville and Petipa.
