Fay, 2021-06-08 Dmitri Shostakovich 1906 1975 has a reputation as one of the leading composers of the twentieth century But the story of his controversial role in history is still being told and his full measure as a musician still being taken This collection of essays goes far in expanding the traditional purview of Shostakovich's world exploring the composer's creativity and art in terms of the expectations historical cultural and political that forged them The collection contains documents that appear for the first time in English Letters that young Miti wrote to his mother offer a glimpse into his dreams and ambitions at the outset of his career Shostakovich's answers to a 1927 questionnaire reveal much about his formative tastes in the arts and the way he experienced the creative process His previously unknown letters to Stalin shed new light on Shostakovich's position within the Soviet artistic elite The essays delve into neglected aspects of Shostakovich's formidable legacy Simon Morrison provides an in depth examination of the choreography costumes decor and music of his ballet *The Bolt* and Gerard McBurney of the musical references parodies and quotations in his operetta *Moscow Cheryomushki* David Fanning looks at Shostakovich's activities as a pedagogue and the mark they left on his students and his own music Peter J Schmelz explores the composer's late period adoption of twelve tone writing in the context of the distinctively Soviet practice of serialism Other contributors include Caryl Emerson Christopher H Gibbs Levon Hakobian Leonid Maximenkov and Rosa Sadykhova In a provocative concluding essay Leon Botstein reflects on the different ways listeners approach the music of Shostakovich      **King Lear** Kenneth Muir, 2015-04-10 Originally published in 1984 With selections organised chronologically this collection presents the best writing on one of Shakespeare's most studied plays The structure displays the changing responses to the play and includes a wide range of criticism from the likes of Coleridge Hazlitt Moulton Granville Barker Orwell Levin Stampfer Gardner and Speaight interspersed with short entries from Keats Raleigh Freud and others The final chapter by the editor elucidates his own thoughts on *Lear* building on his commentary in the Introduction which puts the collection in context      Dmitri Shostakovich Malcolm MacDonald, 1985      *Shostakovich* Elizabeth Wilson, 2006-09-03 This new edition produced to coincide with the centenary of Shostakovich's birth draws on many new writings on the composer In doing so it provides both a more detailed and focused image of Shostakovich's life and a wider view of his cultural background P 4 of cover      **Theodore Thomas Orchestra Programs**, 1909      *George Szell* Michael Charry, 2011-06-01 This book is the first full biography of George Szell one of the greatest orchestra and opera

conductors of the twentieth century From child prodigy pianist and composer to world renowned conductor Szell's career spanned seven decades and he led most of the great orchestras and opera companies of the world including the New York Philharmonic the NBC and Chicago Symphonies the Berlin Philharmonic the Vienna Philharmonic and Opera and the Concertgebouw Orchestra A protégé of composer conductor Richard Strauss at the Berlin State Opera his crowning achievement was his twenty four year tenure as musical director of the Cleveland Orchestra transforming it into one of the world's greatest ensembles touring triumphantly in the United States Europe the Soviet Union South Korea and Japan Michael Charry a conductor who worked with Szell and interviewed him his family and his associates over several decades draws on this first hand material and correspondence orchestra records reviews and other archival sources to construct a lively and balanced portrait of Szell's life and work from his birth in 1897 in Budapest to his death in 1970 in Cleveland Readers will follow Szell from his career in Europe Great Britain and Australia to his guest conducting at the New York Philharmonic and his distinguished tenure at the Metropolitan Opera and Cleveland Orchestra Charry details Szell's personal and musical qualities his recordings and broadcast concerts his approach to the great works of the orchestral repertoire and his famous orchestrational changes and interpretation of the symphonies of Robert Schumann The book also lists Szell's conducting repertoire and includes a comprehensive discography In highlighting Szell's legacy as a teacher and mentor as well as his contributions to orchestral and opera history this biography will be of lasting interest to concert goers music lovers conductors musicians inspired by Szell's many great performances and new generations who will come to know those performances through Szell's recorded legacy

religion and philosophy To grasp Lear's encounter between politics and identity the play demands a wider understanding of the religious influence on political thought As Lear himself realises sovereignty is an extreme glamorous example of a deeper category sacred office Lear also shows duty intersecting with a hierarchy of bastards outlaws women waifs and monks This book introduces concepts like petit treason civil death and waivery into political theological studies complicating Agamben's models Goneril's treason shows the sovereign's consort and children are consecrated lives too Lear's crisis of self knowing stages a landmark critique of office The promise of his poignant speech before the prison is foreclosed by Shakespeare's invention an officer dutifully murdering Cordelia This book's conclusion through Hannah Arendt reconsiders Lear's persistent association with the Holocaust

**Dmitri Shostakovich, Pianist** Sofia Moshevich, 2004 Dmitri Shostakovich 1906-1975 is recognized as one of the greatest composers of the twentieth century yet few people know that he was also an outstanding concert pianist who maintained a hectic performing schedule In *Dmitri Shostakovich Pianist* Sofia Moshevich offers the first detailed examination of Shostakovich the pianist within the context of his life and work as a composer She traces his musical roots piano studies repertoire and concert career through his correspondence with family and friends and his own and his contemporaries' memoirs using material never before available in English This biographical narrative is interwoven with analyses of Shostakovich's piano and chamber works demonstrating how he interpreted his own music For the first time Shostakovich's own recordings are used as primary sources to discover what made his playing unique and to dispel commonly held myths about his style of interpretation His recorded performances are analysed in detail specifically his tempos phrasing dynamics pedal and tonal production Some unpublished variants of musical texts are included and examples of his interpretations are provided and compared to various editions of his published scores

**Shakespeare's Tragic Sequence** Kenneth Muir, 2013-10-11 First published in 1972 The emphasis of this book is that each of Shakespeare's tragedies demanded its own individual form and that although certain themes run through most of the tragedies nearly all critics refrain from the attempt to apply external rules to them The plays are almost always concerned with one person they end with the death of the hero the suffering and calamity that befall him are exceptional and the tragedies include the medieval idea of the reversal of fortune

**Schwann opus**, 1998 *The Penguin Companion to Classical Music* Paul Griffiths, 2004-10-07 This superbly authoritative new work provides a comprehensive A-Z guide to some 1000 years of Western music It explores in detail the lives and achievements of a vast range of composers as well as looking at such key topics as music history from medieval plainchant to contemporary minimalism performers theory and jargon Through Griffiths skilfully blends lightly worn scholarship with personal insight whether examining the emotional colouring that different musical keys achieve or charting the rise and development of the symphony

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
