Vance, 2012-12-06 1 0 V2 AND NULL SUBJECTS IN THE HISTORY OF FRENCH The prototypical Romance null subject language has certain well known characteristics verbal inflection is rich distinguishing six person-number forms subject pronouns are generally emphatic and when there is no need to emphasize the subject the pronoun is not expressed at all Spanish and Italian for example fit this description rather well Modern French however provides a striking contrast to these languages it does not allow subjects to be missing and not unexpectedly it has a verbal agreement system with few overt endings and subject pronouns which are not emphatic One of the goals of the present work is to examine null subjects in two dialects of Romance that fit neither the Italian nor the French model later Old French 12th 13th centuries and Middle French 14th 15th centuries Old French has null subjects only in contexts where the subject would be postverbal if expressed cf Foulet 1928 and Middle French has null subjects in a wider range of syntactic contexts but does not freely allow a 1st person of the verb to be null The work of Vanelli Renzi and Benincà 1985 along with many other works by these authors individually shows that a number of other geographically proximate medieval dialects had similar systems though it appears that there are significant differences in detail among them **Anaphoric Relations in English and French** Francis Cornish, 2015-07-03 First published in 1986 this book focuses on Anaphoric relations in the English and French languages a phenomenon that involves a complex interaction between grammar and discourse Studies of anaphora taking a largely textual approach to the subject have tended to underestimate the effect upon its formation of referential and discourse factors while studies framed within a psycholinguistic and computational perspective have been inclined to minimise the importance of the purely linguistic features connected with anaphora This volume places the study of anaphora upon a firmer foundation by examining both its nature and functions in discourse by pinpointing the range of factors relevant to its operation in the two languages under study and by attempting to relate the textual and interactional perspectives within a more comprehensive framework Syntactic Change in French Sam Wolfe, 2021-12-23 This book provides the most comprehensive and detailed formal account to date of the evolution of French syntax It makes use of the latest formal

French anticausatives Steffen Heidinger, 2010-09-22. How do new ways of encoding valence alternations emerge, how and why do they spread, and what are the consequences of their emergence and spread for already existing patterns? This book discusses these questions on the basis of a concrete example of valence alternation: the French causative anticausative alternation. The main focus of the proposed analysis is the anticausative member of the alternation and the relation between the two formal types of anticausative verbs in French: the reflexive and the unmarked anticausative. *La branche s'est cassée* vs *La branche a cassé*. The branch broke. The emergence and spread of the reflexive anticausative, the consequences of these processes for the unmarked anticausative and the semantic relation between reflexive and unmarked anticausatives are analyzed on the basis of several corpus studies.

Manual of Romance Morphosyntax and Syntax Andreas Dufter, Elisabeth Stark, 2017-09-25. This volume offers theoretically informed surveys of topics that have figured prominently in morphosyntactic and syntactic research into Romance languages and dialects. We define syntax as being the linguistic component that assembles linguistic units such as roots or functional morphemes into grammatical sentences and morphosyntax as being an umbrella term for all morphological relations between these linguistic units which either trigger morphological marking (e.g. explicit case morphemes) or are related to ordering issues (e.g. subjects precede finite verbs whenever there is number agreement between them). All 24 chapters adopt a comparative perspective on these two fields of research, highlighting cross linguistic grammatical similarities and differences within the Romance language family. In addition, many chapters address issues related to variation observable within individual Romance languages and grammatical change from Latin to Romance.

Some Concepts and Consequences of the Theory of Government and Binding Noam Chomsky, 1982-07-29. Noam Chomsky more than any other researcher has radically restructured the study of human language over the past several decades. While the study of government and binding

is an outgrowth of Chomsky's earlier work in transformational grammar it represents a significant shift in focus and a new direction of investigation into the fundamentals of linguistic theory This monograph consolidates and extends this new approach It serves as a concise introduction to government binding theory applies it to several new domains of empirical data and proposes some revisions to the principles of the theory that lead to greater unification descriptive scope and explanatory depth Earlier work in the theory of grammar was concerned primarily with rule systems The accent in government binding theory however is on systems of principles of universal grammar In the course of this book Chomsky proposes and evaluates various general principles that limit and constrain the types of rules that are possible and the ways they interact and function In particular he proposes that rule systems are in fact highly restricted in variety only a finite number of grammars are attainable in principle and these fall into a limited set of types Another consequence of this shift in focus is the change of emphasis from derivations to representations The major topic in the study of syntactic representations is the analysis of empty categories which is a central theme of the book After his introductory comments and a chapter on the variety of rule system Chomsky takes up in turn the general properties of empty categories the functional determination of empty categories parasitic gaps and binding theory and the typology of empty categories The book is the sixth in the series *Linguistic Inquiry Monographs* edited by Samuel Jay Keyser

On Spoken French William J.
