the assumptions of education His critiques of humanism and the modern instrumental mindset in particular have significant implications The work of scholars who have expanded on Heidegger's remarks and those who have been influenced by his philosophy is also surveyed to fill out the examination A vision of education emerges in which teachers and learners awaken to the deadening influences around them and become attuned to the openness of being
