Hellenism and Empire Simon Swain, 1996 Hellenism and Empire explores identity politics and culture in the Greek world of the first three centuries AD the period known as the second sophistic The sources of this identity were the words and deeds of classical Greece and the emphasis placed on Greekness and Greek heritage was far greater then than at any other time Yet this period is often seen as a time of happy consensualism between the Greek and Roman halves of the Roman Empire The first part of the book shows that Greek identity came before any loyalty to Rome and was indeed partly a reaction to Rome while the views of the major authors of the period which are studied in the second part confirm and restate the prior claims of Hellenism

A number of papers deal with historical aspects of Greek lexicography covering all phases of the language i.e. ancient, medieval and modern as well as the interrelations of Greek to neighboring languages. In addition, other papers address more formal issues such as morphological, semantic and syntactic problems that are relevant to the study of Greek lexicography as well as the study of individual words. Finally, in one study, the problem of technical linguistic terminology is addressed along with the methodological, epistemological and other issues relating to the particular problem. The work is of special interest to scholars on the long-standing problems of diachronic semantics, historical morphology and word formation and to all those interested in etymology and the study of words of the Greek language.

Studies in Ancient Greek Dialects Georgios K. Giannakis, Emilio Crespo, Panagiotis Filos, 2017-12-18 A new collective volume with over twenty important studies on less well studied dialects of ancient Greek, particularly of the northern regions. The book covers geographically a broad area of the classical Greek world ranging from Central Greece to the overseas Greek colonies of Thrace and the Black Sea. Particular emphasis is placed on the epichoric varieties of areas on the northern fringe of the classical Greek world including Thessaly, Epirus and Macedonia. Recent advances in research are taken into consideration in providing state-of-the-art accounts of these understudied dialects but also of more well-known dialects like Lesbian. In addition, other papers address special intriguing topics in these but also in other dialects such as Thessalian, Lesbian and Ionic or focus on important multi-dialectal corpora such as the oracular tablets from Dodona. Finally, a number of studies examine broader topics like the supraregional Doric koinai or the concept of dialect continuum or even explore the possibility of an ancient Balkan sprachbund which included Greek too. This new reference work covers a gap in current research and will be indispensable for people interested in Greek dialectology and ancient Greek in general.

The Lindian Chronicle and the Greek Creation of Their Past Carolyn Higbie, 2003 Carolyn Higbie uses an inscription of the first century BC from Lindos to study the ancient Greeks and their past. The inscription contains two inventories. The first catalogues some forty objects given to Athena Lindia by figures from the mythological past including Heracles, Helen and Menelaus and the historical past including Alexander the Great and Hellenistic figures. The second catalogues three epiphanies of Athena Lindia to the townspeople when they were in need of her assistance. By drawing on anthropological approaches as well as archaeological and literary evidence, this book explores what was important to the Greeks about their past, how they reconstructed it and how they made use of it in their present.

Diglossia Mauro A. Fernández, 1993-11-11 Today the notion of diglossia occupies a prominent place in sociolinguistic research Since the 1960s when the dominant sense of diglossia was the complementary sociofunctional distribution of two varieties of the

same language the term has been applied often controversially to a growing number of diverse sociolinguistic situations As a consequence of this extension of the scope of the concept in combination with an increasing interest in the relationship between the role of language and the social structure the number of publications in this field has risen exponentially over the last decades However despite the growing importance of the notion up till now there was no adequate bibliography devoted to diglossia while coverage in other bibliographies does not do justice to the number of works actually published in this area This first comprehensive bibliography of the subject includes almost 3 000 entries although the time span covered is 1960 1990 the book includes several dozens of entries from before 1960 and also a substantial number of very recent publications from the period 1990 1992 The selection of items has not been restricted to a specific definition of diglossia all available publications in which the term or one of its offsprings appears have been included moreover when considered appropriate some material relevant to the subject has been added even though the term is not explicitly used The usefulness of the bibliography has been enhanced significantly by six indexes 1 index of languages 2 diglossia in literature 3 historically oriented works 4 pedagogically oriented works 5 theoretical works and 6 theses and dissertations
