Phenomenology of Illness Havi Carel, 2018-11-01. The experience of illness is a universal and substantial part of human existence. Like death, illness raises important philosophical issues. This may be because illness is often understood as a physiological process that falls within the domain of medical science and is thus outside the purview of philosophy.
