Jones, 2013-03-09 in the culture of medicine and they saw their mission as a generation of profit for stockholders not necessarily medical care for clients Cost effective medicine was the goal in the context of a profit making enterprise Although preventive health care programs were promised very few were realized and they were not nearly comprehensive The definition of unnecessary testing slowly expanded to mean virtually any high cost test requiring the
