Its efforts to foster intellectual, cultural, and spiritual growth within the campus community have drawn distinguished speakers from all fields: the painter Grant Wood, poets Carl Sandberg and Robert Frost, novelists Paul Gallico and Ayn Rand, the arctic explorer Vilhjalmur Stefansson, politicians such as Franklin D. Roosevelt, Lyndon Johnson, and Hillary Clinton, and religious figures and social activists such as Paul Tillich, the Dalai Lama, Elie Wiesel, and James Baldwin, as well as scientists, economists, and other scholars.
