Seabrook,2013-05-01 *The World of the Salt Marsh* is a wide ranging exploration of the southeastern coast its natural history its people and their way of life and the historic and ongoing threats to its ecological survival Focusing on areas from Cape Hatteras North Carolina to Cape Canaveral Florida Charles Seabrook examines the ecological importance of the salt marsh calling it a biological factory without equal Twice daily tides carry in a supply of nutrients that nourish vast meadows of spartina *Spartina alterniflora* a crucial habitat for creatures ranging from tiny marine invertebrates to wading birds The meadows provide vital nurseries for 80 percent of the seafood species including oysters crabs shrimp and a variety of finfish and they are invaluable for storm protection erosion prevention and pollution filtration Seabrook is also concerned with the plight of the people who make their living from the coast s bounty and who carry on its unique culture Among them are Charlie Phillips a fishmonger whose livelihood is threatened by development in McIntosh County Georgia and Vera Manigault of Mount Pleasant South Carolina a basket maker of Gullah Geechee descent who says that the sweetgrass needed to make her culturally significant wares is becoming scarcer For all of the biodiversity and cultural history of the salt marshes many still view them as vast wastelands to be drained diked or improved for development into highways and subdivisions If people can better understand and appreciate these ecosystems Seabrook contends they are more likely to join the growing chorus of scientists conservationists fishermen and coastal visitors and residents calling for protection of these truly amazing places

Swanson,2012-04 Why do we preserve certain landscapes while developing others without restraint Drew A Swanson s in depth look at Wormsloe plantation located on the salt marshes outside of Savannah Georgia explores that question while revealing the broad historical forces that have shaped the lowcountry South Wormsloe is one of the most historic and ecologically significant stretches of the Georgia coast It has remained in the hands of one family from 1736 when Georgia s Trustees granted it to Noble Jones through the 1970s when much of Wormsloe was ceded to Georgia for the creation of a state historic site It has served as a guard post against aggression from Spanish Florida a node in an emerging cotton economy connected to far flung places like Lancashire and India a retreat for pleasure and leisure and a carefully maintained historic site and green space Like many lowcountry places Wormsloe is inextricably tied to regional national and global environments and is the product of transatlantic exchanges Swanson argues that while visitors to Wormsloe value what they perceive to be an authentic undisturbed place this landscape is actually the product of aggressive management over generations He also finds that Wormsloe is an ideal place to get at hidden stories such as African American environmental and agricultural knowledge conceptions of health and

disease the relationship between manual labor and views of nature and the ties between historic preservation and natural resource conservation Remaking Wormsloe Plantation connects this distinct Georgia place to the broader world adding depth and nuance to the understanding of our own conceptions of nature and history *Against the Tides* Ronald Rudin,2021-11-15 For four centuries dykes held back the largest tides in the world in the Bay of Fundy region of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia These dykes turned salt marsh into arable land and made farming possible but by the 1940s they had fallen into disrepair Against the Tides is the never before told story of the Maritime Marshland Rehabilitation Administration MMRA a federal agency created in 1948 to reshape the landscape Although agency engineers often borrowed from long standing dykeland practices they were so convinced of their own expertise that they sometimes disregarded local conditions marginalizing farmers in the process The engineers hubris resulted in tidal dams that compromised some of the region s rivers leaving behind environmental damage This book is a vivid richly detailed account of a distinctive landscape and its occupants revealing the push pull of local and expert knowledge and the role of the state in the postwar era
