Boller, 1992 During the heyday of McCarthyism the Chicago Tribune offended by something he had written contemptuously dismissed Paul Boller as an obscure professor he was then teaching at Southern Methodist University in Dallas Texas Some forty five years later reflecting on the incident Boller wrote an essay on what it was like to be an obscure professor at one of America's less publicized campuses in a conservative community during the late 1950s and early 1960s That essay became the foundation for this collection of autobiographical selections reflecting the interests and pursuits of a man who gained national recognition both inside the academic community and beyond but still values his obscurity Whether it is a study of the much maligned Calvin Coolidge or an account of his Navy service as a translator of Japanese during World War II Boller brings to his writing a fresh approach and a lively and wry wit      Essays of an Information Scientist: Science, literacy, policy, evaluation, and other essays Eugene Garfield, 1990      **Essays of an Information Scientist** Eugene Garfield, 1977      **Moral Rights, Creativity, and Copyright Law** Sarah Hook, 2023-12-29 This book argues that moral rights provisions in copyright law rest on a misunderstanding or romanticisation of the role of the author The Romantic conception of authorship as a lone genius creating from nothing sensitive and vulnerable has helped publishers push for strong copyright reform But is this conception borne out in practice especially in a world of meme culture of artificial intelligence generated art and poetry and of open source and fan fiction This book probes the romantic vignette of the author through its legal adoption Moral rights are rights that attach to the non economic for example intellectual or emotional interests of an author in their work Much like defamation moral rights see the right of reputation as superior to the right of freedom of expression However unlike defamation moral rights are not protecting against defamatory actions against a person In most jurisdictions they are provisions set within copyright regimes regimes whose purpose is to incentivise innovation Challenging the way we think about authorship and how it should be protected by law the book draws on a wide range of historical and contemporary examples to demonstrate how moral rights can constitute a barrier to transformative creativity While authors and artists require strong rights to protect their ability to earn an income and incentivise creativity moral rights the book argues may in turn actually harm their ability to do so This timely criticism of moral rights will appeal to researchers students policy makers and lawyers working in the area of intellectual property law as well as legal theorists sociolegal scholars and legal historians with relevant interests      Poetry, Catastrophe, and Hope in the Vision of Isaiah Francis Landy, 2023-06-21 The book of Isaiah is one of the longest and strangest books of the Hebrew Bible composed over several centuries and traversing the catastrophe that befell the two kingdoms of Israel and Judah in the 8th and 6th centuries BCE Francis Landy's book tells the story of the poetic response to catastrophe and the hope for a new and perfect world on the other side The study traces two parallel developments the displacement of the Davidic promise onto

the Persian Empire Israel and the prophet himself and the transition from exclusively male images of the deity to the matching of male and female prototypes whereby YHWH takes the place of the warrior goddess Poetry Catastrophe and Hope in the Book of Isaiah consists of close readings of individual passages in Isaiah commencing with Chapter One and the problems of beginning and ending with Deutero Isaiah composed subsequent to the Babylonian exile The volume is arranged thematically as well as sequentially the first chapter following the introduction concerns gender the second death the third the Oracles about the Nations At the centre there is what Landy calls the constitutive enigma Isaiah's commission in his vision to speak so that people will not understand This renders the entire book potentially incomprehensible the more we try to understand it the greater the difficulty For Landy this creates a model of reading and writing the challenge and the risk of going up blind alleys of trying to make sense of a disastrous world Isaiah's commission pervades the book Throughout there is a promise of an age of clarity as well as social and political transformation which is always deferred beyond the horizon Hence it is a book without an ending or with multiple endings In the final chapters the author turns to the central Chapter Thirty Three a *mise en abyme* of the book and a prayer for deliverance and the issues of exile and the possibility of return Like every poetic work particularly in an era of cultural collapse it is a critique of the past and a hope for a new humanity
