support the idea that involved in ordinary language comprehension are complex and demanding cognitive processes The author demonstrates that these processes exist not only at the explicit level of an utterance but also at a deeper level of computing where the background information taken for granted as already known and shared between interlocutors is processed The author shows that experimental research can suggest new theoretical models for presupposition thus this book will be of interest to researchers and students of psycholinguistics the philosophy of language and experimental pragmatics

Descriptions and Beyond Marga Reimer, Anne Bezuidenhout, 2004 In 1905 Bertrand Russell published *On Denoting* in which he proposed and defended a quantificational account of definite descriptions Forty five years later in *On Referring* Peter Strawson claimed that Russell was mistaken definite descriptions do not function as quantifiers but paradigmatically as referring expressions Ever since scores of theorists have attempted to adjudicate this debate Others have gone beyond the question of the proper analysis of definite descriptions focusing instead on the complex relations between definites indefinites and pronouns These relations are often examined with attention to the phenomena of scope and anaphora This collection assembles nineteen new papers on definite descriptions and related topics The contributors include both philosophers and linguists many of whom have been active participants in the various debates concerning descriptions The volume contains a brief general introduction and is divided into six sections each of which is accompanied by a detailed introduction of its own Several of the sections concern issues associated with the Russell Strawson debate These include the sections on incomplete descriptions the referential attributive distinction and presupposition and truth value gaps There is also a section on the representation of definites and indefinites in semantic theory containing papers that reject certain core assumptions of the Russellian paradigm Linguists interested in definites have traditionally been concerned with how such expressions interact with other expressions including pronouns and indefinites They have explored and continue to explore these interactions through the complex phenomena of scope and anaphora In the section dealing with anaphoric pronouns and descriptions indefinites and dynamic syntax semantics five linguists propose and defend their views on these and related issues Finally there is a section that concerns the relation between proper names and descriptions and more particularly the idea that some names those introduced into the language by description are semantically equivalent to definite descriptions

The Semantics of Determiners Carrie Gillon, 2014-07-03 This book investigates the properties of determiners in Skwxw 7mesh Squamish Salish Determiners in Skwxw 7mesh are shown to behave significantly differently from the definite determiner the in English as Skwxw 7mesh lacks a definite indefiniteness distinction All Skwxw 7mesh DPs can be used in both familiar and novel contexts and are not required to refer to a unique entity Instead Skwxw 7mesh determiners are split along deictic non deictic lines Determiners can therefore vary in terms of their semantics However determiners are argued to universally encode contextual sensitivity domain restriction A strict correlation between the syntax and semantics of determiners is proposed if an article occupies D it is context sensitive Conversely articles that do not occupy D are not context sensitive This book also explores determiner systems in other Salish languages Deixis is a part of most of the Salish determiner systems but the systems vary quite a bit from one another Other languages discussed include Inuttut Labrador Inuktitut Lithuanian and Maori

Quantitative Approaches to Grammar and Grammatical Change Sam Featherston, Yannick Versley, 2016-07-25 The newly emerging field of theoretically informed but simultaneously empirically based syntax is dynamic but little represented in the literature This volume addresses this need While there has previously been something of a gulf between theoretical linguists in the generative tradition and those linguists who work with quantitative data types this gap is narrowing In the light of the empirical revolution in the study of syntax even people whose primary concern is grammatical theory take note of processing effects and attribute certain effects to them Correspondingly workers focusing on the surface evidence can relate more to the concepts of the theoreticians because the two layers of explanation have been brought into contact And these workers too must account for the data gathered by the theoreticians An additional innovation is the generative analysis of historical data this is now seen as psycholinguistic theory relevant data like any other These papers are thus a snapshot of some of the work currently being done in evidence based grammar using both experimental and historical data
