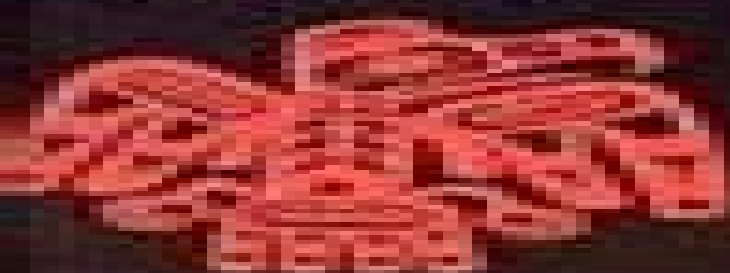

A Grammar of Central Alaskan Yupik (CAY) Osahito Miyaoka, 2012-12-06 The volume is a major grammar of Central Alaskan Yupik CAY It is the culmination of the author's linguistic studies done in Alaska and elsewhere since around 1960 with assistance of many native speakers Central Alaskan Yupik is currently the most vigorous of the nineteen remaining Native Alaskan languages Descriptive in nature extensive and deep this grammar is of typological and of ethnological anthropological interest Given the severely endangered state of the language this much of descriptive linguistic material is without comparison in the field

Voice syncretism Nicklas N. Bahrt, 2021 This book provides a comprehensive typological account of voice syncretism focusing on resemblance in formal verbal marking between two or more of the following seven voices passives antipassives reflexives reciprocals anticausatives causatives and applicatives It covers voice syncretism from both synchronic and diachronic perspectives and has been structured in a manner that facilitates convenient access to information about specific patterns of voice syncretism their distribution and development The book is based on a survey of voice syncretism in 222 geographically and genealogically diverse languages but also thoroughly revisits previous research on the phenomenon Voice syncretism is approached systematically by establishing and exploring patterns of voice syncretism that can logically be posited for the seven voices of focus in the book 21 simplex patterns when one considers two of the seven voices sharing the same marking e g reflexive reciprocal syncretism and 99 complex patterns when one considers more than two of the voices sharing the same marking e g reflexive reciprocal anticausative syncretism In a similar vein 42 paths of development can logically be posited if it is assumed that voice marking in each of the seven voices can potentially develop one of the other six voice functions e g reflexive voice marking developing a reciprocal function This approach enables the discussion of both voice syncretism that has received considerable attention

in the literature notably middle syncretism involving the reflexive reciprocal anticausative and or passive voices and voice syncretism that has received little or not treatment in the past including seemingly contradictory patterns such as causative anticausative and passive antipassive syncretism In the survey almost all simplex patterns are attested in addition to seventeen complex patterns In terms of diachrony evidence is presented and discussed for twenty paths of development The book strives to highlight the variation found in voice syncretism across the world s languages and encourage further research into the phenomenon *On looking into words (and beyond)* Claire Bowerman, Laurence Horn, Raffaella Zanuttini, 2017-05-18

While linguistic theory is in continual flux as progress is made in our ability to understand the structure and function of language one constant has always been the central role of the word On looking into words is a wide ranging volume spanning current research into word based morphology morphosyntax the phonology morphology interface and related areas of theoretical and empirical linguistics The 26 papers that constitute this volume extend morphological and grammatical theory to signed as well as spoken language to diachronic as well as synchronic evidence and to birdsong as well as human language

The Linguistic Cycle Elly van Gelderen, 2011-04-08 Elly van Gelderen provides examples of linguistic cycles from a number of languages and language families along with an account of the linguistic cycle in terms of minimalist economy principles A cycle involves grammaticalization from lexical to functional category followed by renewal Some well known cycles involve negatives where full negative phrases are reanalyzed as words and affixes and are then renewed by full phrases again Verbal agreement is another example full pronouns are reanalyzed as agreement markers and are renewed again Each chapter provides data on a separate cycle from a myriad of languages Van Gelderen argues that the cross linguistic similarities can be seen as Economy Principles present in the initial cognitive system or Universal Grammar She further claims that some of the cycles can be used to classify a language as analytic or synthetic and she provides insight into the shape of the earliest human language and how it evolved *Being in Being* Skaay of the Qquuna Qiighawaay, 2023-10-28 Being in Being contains three masterpieces by legendary Haida mythteller Skaay of the Qquuna Qiighawaay The shortest recounts the high points of the legend of his family The longest Raven Travelling is the most complex version of the story of the Raven ever recorded on the Northwest Coast The third is The Qquuna Cycle the largest and most complex literary work in any Native Canadian language It is a poem of epic length and one of the true masterpieces of North American literature
