David McNeill, a pioneer in the ongoing study of the relationship between gesture and language, set about answering this question over twenty-five years ago. In *Gesture and Thought* he brings together years of this research, arguing that gesturing, an act which has been popularly understood as an accessory to speech, is actually a dialectical component of language. *Gesture and Thought* expands on McNeill's acclaimed classic *Hand and Mind*. Gestures are both the imagery and components of language. The smallest element of this dialectic is the growth point, a snapshot of an utterance at its beginning, psychological stage.
