perception **The Historical Evolution of Earlier African American English** Alexander Kautzsch, 2012-05-02 Based on a 500 000 word corpus of early sources collected from ex slave narratives ex slave recordings and interviews with hoodoo priests this book reconstructs the English spoken by African Americans between 1830 and 1920 By means of detailed quantitative analyses three linguistic features negation patterns copula usage and relative marker choice are interpreted along the lines of temporal change regional diversity and variation across gender Additionally some 300 non standard letters written by African Americans in the 19th century are compared to the main corpus in order to identify differences between speech and writing

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
