The importance of the Low Countries as a centre for the study of foreign languages is well known. The mutual relationship between the Dutch grammatical tradition and the Western European context has however been largely neglected. In this collection of papers on the history of linguistics in the Low Countries the editors have made an effort to present the Dutch tradition in connection with that of the neighbouring countries. Three articles by Claes Dibbets and Klifman deal with the earliest stages of the development of a grammar for the Dutch vernacular. Several important European figures worked in the Low Countries; their contribution to linguistics is discussed in articles on Vossius, Rademaker, Spinoza, Klijnsmit and one of the most original phoneticians of European linguistics, Montanus Hulscher. This volume should be of interest for all specialists in the history of linguistics in Europe who are interested in the interdependence of the various traditions.

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
