Language in the Americas Joseph H. Greenberg, 1987-06-01 This book is concerned primarily with the evidence for the validity of a genetic unit Amerind embracing the vast majority of New World languages The only languages excluded are those belonging to the Na Dene and Eskimo Aleut families It examines the now widely held view that Haida the most distant language genetically is not to be included in Na Dene It confined itself to Sapir's data although the evidence could have been buttressed considerably by the use of more recent materials What survives is a body of evidence superior to that which could be adduced under similar restrictions for the affinity of Albanian Celtic and Armenian all three universally recognized as valid members of the Indo European family of languages A considerable number of historical hypotheses emerge from the present and the forthcoming volumes Of these the most fundamental bears on the question of the peopling of the Americas If the results presented in this volume and in the companion volume on Eurasiatic are valid the classification of the world s languages based on genetic criteria undergoes considerable simplification American Indian Languages Lyle Campbell, 2000-09-21 Native American languages are spoken from Siberia to Greenland and from the Arctic to Tierra del Fuego they include the southernmost language of the world Yaghan and some of the northernmost Eskimoan Campbell s project is to take stock of what is currently known about the history of Native American languages and in the process examine the state of American Indian historical linguistics and the success and failure of its various methodologies There is remarkably little consensus in the field largely due to the 1987 publication of Language in the Americas by Joseph Greenberg He claimed to trace a historical relation between all American Indian languages of North and South America implying that most of the Western Hemisphere was settled by a single wave of immigration from Asia This has caused intense controversy and Campbell as a leading scholar in the field intends this volume to be in part a response to Greenberg Finally Campbell demonstrates that the historical study of Native American languages has always relied on up to date methodology and theoretical assumptions and did not as is often believed lag behind the European historical linguistic tradition in the Americas Joseph Harold Greenberg, 1987 **Language in America** Charlton Laird, 1970 The author examines the evolution of language as the impact of man upon language and of language upon man as language has been used on this continent from prehistoric times to the present Cover 1 A Key Into the Language of America Roger Williams, 2010-01-01 Written in 1643 at a time of great turmoil between Native Americans and the English settlers A Key into the Language of America is a study of American Indian life religion and language Written by an advocate of Native American rights and treatment the book presents a number of ideas that seem anti English and bring to light the prejudices held by the pilgrims The book was the first study of Native American language written in English and the commentary on Indian ways of life make it a worthwhile read Roger Williams c 1603 1683 was the founder of Rhode Island and an outspoken pioneer who fought for Native American rights in New England in the 17th century Language in the USA Charles A.
