

Developmental Language **DISORDERS**

5 areas of speech & language that may be affected:

SEMANTICS

Word knowledge & learning, ability to identify things & describe their function, categorize things, say words that have the same/opposite meaning.

WORD FINDING

Knowing a word, but finding it difficult to find the correct word use. A child might use empty, non-specific words or those that are similar, but not on target.

UNDERSTANDING

Ability to follow language, understand concepts, grammar, sentences & narratives. Child may struggle to remember instructions or look to others or environment for clues.

PHONOLOGICAL AWARENESS

Awareness of the sounds & structure of words, such as those that start with the same sound (alliteration) or rhyme or length (syllables). Child may struggle to recognize & work with sounds.

PRAGMATICS (SOCIAL)

Ability to use language & non-verbal communication (body language, eye contact, etc.) to understand and respond to social rules.
