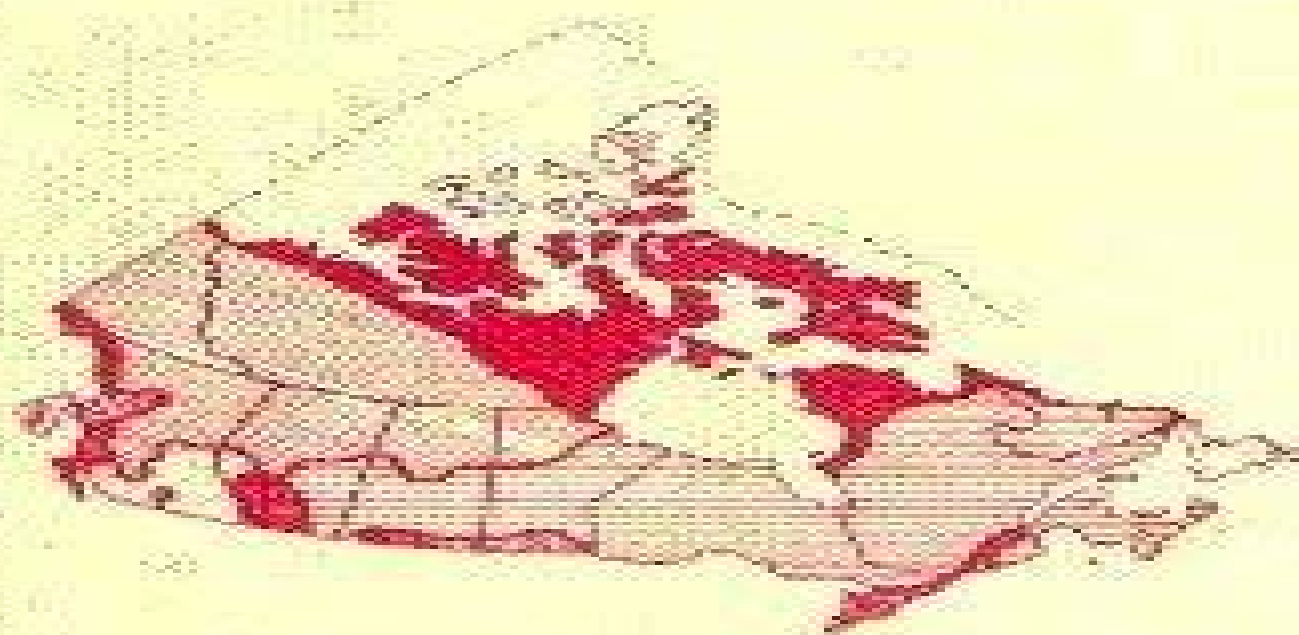

subtype of epistemic or some other modality or of tense aspect The introductory chapter sets out cross linguistic parameters for studying evidentiality It is followed by twelve chapters which deal with typologically different languages from various parts of the world Shipibo Conibo Jarawara Tariana and Myky from South America West Greenlandic Eskimo Western Apache and Eastern Pomo from North America Qiang Tibeto Burman Yukaghir Siberian isolate Turkic languages languages of the Balkans and Abkhaz Northwest Caucasian The final chapter summarises some of the recurrent patterns **Arctic**
