prevalence of vowel reduction processes with extreme outcomes and higher average morpheme word ratios The results suggest that highly complex syllable structure is a linguistic type distinct from but sharing some characteristics with other proposed holistic phonological types including stress timed and consonantal languages The results point to word stress and specific patterns of gestural organization as playing important roles in the diachronic development of these patterns out of simpler syllable structures
