Grammaticalization Heiko Narrog, Bernd Heine, 2021 This textbook introduces and explains the fundamental issues major research questions and current approaches in the study of grammaticalization Each chapter offers guidance on further reading and concludes with study questions to encourage further discussion there is also a glossary of key terminology in the field

Grammaticalization Bernd Heine, Ulrike Claudi, Friederike Hünemeyer, 1991 Grammaticalization the process of converting regular lexical items and structures into conventionally interpreted grammatical morphemes has traditionally been perceived as a syntactic or morphological process Presenting a wealth of evidence from African languages the authors argue that the development of grammatical categories is in fact strongly influenced by pragmatic and cognitive forces factors that are located outside the confines of language structure They discuss previous models and relate grammaticalization studies to alternative approaches such as localism and natural grammar theory This volume challenges theories which describe language as a static system as well as those which assume that linguistic categorization is based on discrete morpheme types word classes or sentence constituents In contrast the book's central argument is that both language structure and language use are dynamic phenomena and that linguistic behavior is essentially a creative activity That creativity manifests itself for example in conceptual transfer leading to the encoding of more abstract concepts and of grammatical categories Another key element of this theory is captured in the term grammaticalization chain which refers to a specific kind of linguistic category which cuts across morpheme types and word classes and has both a synchronic and diachronic dimension

Grammaticalization Paul J. Hopper, Elizabeth Closs Traugott, 2003-07-31 This is a general introduction to grammaticalization the change whereby lexical terms and constructions come in certain linguistic contexts to serve grammatical functions and once grammaticalized continue to develop new grammatical functions The authors synthesize work from several areas of linguistics The second edition has been thoroughly revised with substantial updates on theoretical and methodological issues that have arisen in the decade since the first edition and includes a significantly expanded bibliography Particular attention is paid to recent debates over directionality in change and the role of grammaticalization in creolization

The Limits of Grammaticalization Anna Giacalone Ramat, Paul J. Hopper, 1998-01-01 The earliest use of the term grammaticalization was to refer to the process whereby lexical words of a language such as English keep in he keeps bees become grammatical forms such as the auxiliary in he keeps looking at me Changes of this kind which involve semantic fading and a downshift from a major to a minor

category have generally been agreed to come under the heading of grammaticalization. But other changes that equally contribute to new grammatical forms do not involve this kind of fading. In recent years a debate has arisen over how to constrain the term theoretically. Is grammaticalization to be distinguished from lexicalization, the creation and fixing of new words out of older patterns of compounding? If so, how is the line to be drawn between a form that is grammatical and one that is lexical? Should the term grammaticalization be extended to the study of the origins of grammatical constructions in general? If so, it will have to include broader issues such as word order change and the reanalysis of phrases. What principles govern these processes? Is grammaticalization a unidirectional event or can change occur in the reverse direction? The authors of the papers in this volume approach these important questions from a variety of data types including historical texts, creoles and a typologically broad sample of modern and ancient languages.
