American Indian Languages Lyle Campbell, 2000-09-21 Native American languages are spoken from Siberia to Greenland and from the Arctic to Tierra del Fuego they include the southernmost language of the world Yaghan and some of the northernmost Eskimoan Campbell s project is to take stock of what is currently known about the history of Native American languages and in the process examine the state of American Indian historical linguistics and the success and failure of its various methodologies There is remarkably little consensus in the field largely due to the 1987 publication of *Language in the Americas* by Joseph Greenberg He claimed to trace a historical relation between all American Indian languages of North and South America implying that most of the Western Hemisphere was settled by a single wave of immigration from Asia This has caused intense controversy and Campbell as a leading scholar in the field intends this volume to be in part a response to Greenberg Finally Campbell demonstrates that the historical study of Native American languages has always relied on up to date methodology and theoretical assumptions and did not as is often believed lag behind the European historical linguistic tradition

Turner, Dana Lepofsky, 2024-11-05 Linguistic and Genetic mtDNA Connections between Native Peoples of Alaska and California Ancient Mariners of the Middle Holocene traces the linguistic and biological connections between contemporary Aleut people of southwest Alaska and historic Utian people of central California During the Middle Holocene Period Aleut and Utian languages diverged from their common parent language Proto Aleut Utian PAU spoken by people who resided on or near Kodiak Island in coastal southwest Alaska Around the time of divergence Utians departed the PAU homeland migrating by watercraft along the eastern Pacific coast to the San Francisco Bay Area The affiliation between Aleut and Utian languages is strongly supported by comparative linguistics and by the genetic link mtDNA of groups speaking these languages On their migration Utians encountered coastal groups speaking languages different from their own Through these prolonged and intimate interactions words were borrowed from Utian into the languages of these native coastal communities Other significant findings explored in this book are the lack of compelling evidence for the kinship of Eskimo and Aleut peoples despite scholarship's long term acceptance of this proposal and the discovery of language structure features shared by Yeniseian and Na Dene indicating an historical connection for these circumarctic languages

**Language Contact in Amazonia** Aleksandra Iñárr'evna Aikhenval'd, 2002 This book considers how forms and meanings of different languages at different times may resemble one another and what the explanation is for this The author aims a to explain and identify the relationship between areal diffusion and the genetic development of languages and b to discover the means of distinguishing what may cause one language to share the characteristics of another This is done using the example of Arawak and Tucanoan languages spoken in the large area of the Vaup s river basin in northwest Amazonia which spans Colombia and Brazil In this region language is seen as a badge of identity language mixing interaction and influence are

resisted for ideological reasons Professor Aikhenvald considers which grammatical categories are most and which are least likely to be borrowed in a situation of prolonged language contact where lexical borrowing is reduced to a minimum She provides a genetic analysis of the languages of the region and considers their historical relationships with languages of the same family outside it She also examines changes brought about by recent contact with European languages and culture and the linguistic and cultural effects of being part of a group that is aware its language and identity are threatened The book is presented in relatively nontechnical language and will interest linguists and anthropologists

volume is dedicated to more empirically oriented studies which look into language contact constellations with a Romance donor language and a non European recipient language Spanish Amerindian Guaran Otom Quichua contacts are investigated in the comparative study by Dik Bakker Jorge Gomez Rendón and Ewald Hekking Peter Bakker and Robert A Papen discuss the influence exerted by French on the indigenous languages of Canada The extent of the Portuguese impact on the Amazonian language Kulina is studied by Stefan Dienst John Holm looks at the validity of the hypothesis that bound morphology normally falls victim to Creolization processes and draws his evidence mainly from Portuguese based Creoles For Austronesia borrowings and calques from French still are an understudied phenomenon Claire Moyse Faurie's contribution to this topic is thus a pioneer's work Similarly Françoise Rose and Odile Renault Lescure provide us with fresh data on language contact in French Guiana The final article of this collection by Mauro Tosco demonstrates that the Italianization of languages of the former Italian colonies in East Africa is only weak This volume provides the reader with new insights on all levels of language contact related studies The volume addresses especially a readership that has a strong interest in language contact in general and its repercussions on the phonology grammar and lexicon of the recipient languages Experts of Romance language contact and specialists of Amerindian languages Afro Asiatic languages Austronesian languages and Pidgins and Creoles will find the volume highly valuable
