Jr. Davis, 2012-12-06 The second edition of this book originally published in 1981 is the result of a collaborative effort of pathologists from 6 countries It is more extensive than the first edition Renal adenomas have been represented in more detail Several new entities unrecognized in 1981 have been discussed including metanephric adenoma chromophobe carcinoma and renal medullary carcinoma More extensive definition and discussion of nephroblastic lesions is given including mesoblastic nephroma and cystic nephroma Two new entities are included clear cell carcinoma and rhabdoid tumor A list of miscellaneous tumours such as small cell carcinoma ossifying renal tumour renal hamartoma and nephrogenic adenofibroma is also added

Sobin, 2012-12-06 This classification is based primarily on the microscopic characteristics of tumours It is therefore concerned with the identification of cell types and histological patterns as seen by conventional light microscopy In general time honoured terms have been retained Synonyms are listed only if they have been widely used or if they are considered to be important for understanding the disease process In such cases the preferred term is given first followed by the synonym in parentheses The individuality of a tumour manifests itself principally in its histological appearance and the extent of spread at the time of diagnosis This volume is concerned only with the histological classification of tumours Anatomical extent or staging is covered in the TNM Classification The histological classification of a tumour depends on two main parameters typing and grading and a number of additional parameters which may apply to selected examples Histological Typing This divides tumours of a given organ into different types according to their direction of differentiation Although this may frequently indicate the underlying histogenesis of the tumour it may be difficult or impossible to identify the cell of origin Note is taken of the structure and function of cell types as well as the overall growth pattern of the tumour with the aim of matching these features to those of a normal tissue found in the same organ

The classification represents an effort to bring together the variety of ways thymic epithelial neoplasms have been classified. It focuses on their growth characteristics i.e. encapsulation and invasion and cytoarchitectural features e.g. spindle epithelioid and lymphocyte content. The classification though restricted to the thymic region rather than the mediastinum in general also covers neuroendocrine germ cell lymphoid and stromal tumours as well as tumour like lesions and the neck tumours of thymic or related branchial pouch derivation.

Histological Typing of Testis Tumours F.K. Mostofi, I. Sesterhenn, L. H. Sobin, 1998. The second edition of this book is the result of collaborative efforts of pathologists from 9 countries. It is more extensive than the previous edition published in 1977. The basic histological classification of the various categories has been retained since it has gained world wide popularity however the individual categories have been described in more detail. A number of new entities have been included: placental site trophoblastic tumour, large cell calcifying Sertoli cell tumour, cystic granulosa cell tumour of infancy, tumour of ovarian epithelial type, testicular lesion of adrenogenital syndrome and testicular lesion of androgen insensitivity syndrome. Since the first edition a number of tumour markers have been used in clinical diagnosis, staging and monitoring the response to therapy. The cells of origin of the two widely used markers have been identified. This revised edition contains 175 colour photomicrographs.

Histological Typing of Prostate Tumours K.F. Mostofi, I.A. Sesterhenn, C.J. Jr. Davis, 2002-01-11. This revision of the book originally published in 1980 is the result of a collaboration among scientists from 10 countries. The authors include not only pathologists but also a urologist and a basic scientist. The second edition containing 146 colour photographs is considerably more extensive than its predecessor. A number of new entities unrecognized in 1980 are included: prostatic intraepithelial neoplasia which is commonly associated with carcinoma and may also be seen in a biopsy for elevated PSA, basal cell carcinoma, small cell carcinoma, paracrine endocrine elements, variants of carcinoma and stromal sarcoma. The criteria for the diagnosis of carcinoma have been expanded including the minimal criteria. The Gleason grading system based on growth pattern is presented in detail. The WHO grading system based on nuclear anaplasia and glandular differentiation is more clearly defined.

Histological Typing of Oesophageal and Gastric Tumours Hidenobu Watanabe, Jeremy R. Jass, Leslie H. Sobin, 1990-03-30.
