**Johnners** Barry Johnston, 2004-05-10 Born in 1912 Brian spent a luxurious childhood in a Queen Anne house in Hertfordshire When he was just ten years old the family suffered the tragic death of his father and were forced to sell the family home A few years later Brian was sent to Eton which he always said were the happiest days of his life and where he demonstrated an early flair for cricket After leaving school he longed to join the theatre but instead travelled to Hamburg and then Brazil to learn the family trade the coffee business His travels were cut short after eighteen months when he became gravely ill and he returned home War broke out and Brian joined the 2nd Battallion Grenadier Guards serving in Normandy after D Day where he earned the Military Cross for untiring determination and cheerfulness under fire Six weeks after being demobbed he joined the BBC He only planned to work there a few months he ended up staying for 48 years where his career ranged from performing in music halls presenting children s television shows and of course presenting and commentating on television and radio which quickly made him a household name Told with candour and affection *THE LIFE OF BRIAN* reveals the private side of a man who became a public institution *A Further Slice Of Johnners* Brian Johnston, 2011-11-30 When Brian Johnston was a schoolboy his reports were full of phrases such as talks too much in school and apt to be a buffoon Later millions of radio listeners would be delighted to discover that some things never changed Johnners brought his unique wit and personal charm to an enormous range of BBC radio and television programmes for nearly 50 years from *In Town Tonight* and *Down Your Way* to *Test Match Special* After Brian died in 1994 Christopher Martin Jenkins wrote It is hard to believe that anyone in the history of broadcasting has induced such widespread affection *A Further Slice of Johnners* covers Brian s early days from his childhood in Hertfordshire and his schooldays at Eton and Oxford to his job in the family coffee business in the City and his service with the Grenadier Guards during the Second World War There is also a selection of the most memorable characters and locations from his fifteen years on the Radio Four programme *Down Your Way* Finally there is a collection of Brian s popular *View From the Boundary* interviews on *Test Match Special* including fascinating conversations with Eric Idle John Major and Peter O Toole *The Wit of Cricket* Barry Johnston, 2010-05-27 A bumper collection of the funniest anecdotes jokes and stories from cricket s best loved personalities Cricket is a funny old game even when rain stops play Now you can read not only the most popular stories by five of the game s all time great characters Richie Benaud Dickie Bird Henry Blofeld Brian Johnston and Fred Trueman but also the humour and insights of modern players including Michael Atherton Andrew Flintoff Darren Gough Kevin Pietersen and Shane Warne Crammed full of dozens of hilarious anecdotes about legendary Test cricketers such as Ian Botham Geoffrey Boycott Denis Compton Michael Holding and Merv Hughes plus broadcasting gaffes sledging short sighted umpires and the first male stalker at Lord s *Round Mr Horne* Barry Johnston, 2013-07-08 When Kenneth Horne died in 1969 at the age of 61 he was described as the last of the truly great radio comics In a broadcasting career spanning more than 25 years he starred in three

of the most popular radio comedy series of all time Much Binding in the Marsh Beyond Our Ken and Round the Horne Born in 1907 Horne was the youngest of seven children of a Congregationalist preacher and MP He won a half blue for tennis at Cambridge but was sent down for failing his exams In 1939 he joined the RAF and rose to the rank of Wing Commander before he broke into broadcasting after compeering a troop concert on the BBC With his brother officer Richard Dickie Murdoch he created the hugely popular Much Binding in the Marsh set on a remote RAF station somewhere in England which ran for ten years After leaving the RAF he successfully combined two careers as a businessman and a broadcaster until he suffered a stroke in 1958 and had to cut short his business career During his convalescence he helped to devise the legendary radio series Beyond Our Ken in which he presided amiably over a cast of anarchic characters played by Kenneth Williams Hugh Paddick Betty Marsden and Bill Pertwee This was followed by Round the Horne which has been called the funniest comedy series in radio history In 1969 Kenneth Horne collapsed and died on stage while presenting a television awards programme

The Final Innings Christopher Sandford,2019-07-16 The declaration of war against Germany on 3 September 1939 brought an end to the second and as yet final Golden Age of English cricket Over 200 first class English players signed up to fight in that first year 52 never came back In many ways the summer of 1939 was the end of innocence Using unpublished letters diaries and memoirs Christopher Sandford recreates that last summer looking at men like George Macaulay who took a wicket with his first ball in Test cricket but was struck down while serving with the RAF in 1940 Maurice Turnbull the England all rounder who fell during the Normandy landings and Hedley Verity who still holds cricketing records but who died in the invasion of Sicily Few English cricket teams began their first post war season without holding memorial ceremonies for

the men they had lost The Final Innings pays homage not only to these men but to the lost innocence heroism and human endurance of the age
