Historicizing Fiction Fictionalizing History brings together two authors Umberto Eco and Orhan Pamuk not frequently studied in comparison By focusing on their non fictional works to present a unique study of the methods and concepts of representation Murthy uses contemporary historical novels to examine fictional depictions of reality and provides a fresh perspective on representation studies in literature Written in an accessible style and tapping into fields as varied as literary and critical theory the historical novel postmodernism and historiography Historicizing Fiction Fictionalizing History considers the ways in which reality as discourse confronts a text external reality and how this confrontation affects the autonomy of the fictional space topics that remain persistently problematic areas within literary studies Eco s *The Name of the Rose* and Baudolino and Pamuk s *My Name is Red* and *Snow* with their topical concerns and methods of representation promise a rewarding comparative study This book provides an early critical framework for these four works placing them within the rubric of the postmodernist historical novel as creative works that also comment on the process of literary writing through their recreation of historical pasts In this respect Historicizing Fiction Fictionalizing History promises to be an engaging read in literary criticism and historiography as well as a handy companion for Eco and Pamuk enthusiasts

The Art of Indirection in British Espionage Fiction Robert Lance Snyder, 2011-07-25 In contrast to the classical detective story the spy novel tends to be considered a suspect somewhat subversive genre While previous studies have focused on its historical thematic and ideological dimensions this critical work examines British espionage fiction s unique narrative form which is typically elliptical oblique and recursive Featured works include eighteen novels by Eric Ambler Graham Greene Len Deighton John le Carre Stella Rimington and Charles Cumming most of which exemplify the existential or serious spy thriller Half of these texts pertain to the Cold War era and the other half to its aftermath in the so called Age of Terrorism

about their own present Employing cultural criticism and trauma theory Byerman frames these works as survivor narratives that rewrite the grand American narrative of individual achievement and the march of democracy The choice to write historical narratives he says must be understood historically These writers earned widespread recognition for their writing in the 1980s a period of African American commercial success as well as the economic decline of the black working class and an increase in black on black crime Byerman contends that a shared experience of suffering joins African American individuals in a group identity and writing about the past serves as an act of resistance against essentialist ideas of black experience shaping the cultural discourse of the present Byerman demonstrates that these novels disrupt the temptation in American society to engage history only to limit its significance or to crown successful individuals while forgetting the victims

Against Anarchy Cord-Christian Casper,2020-08-24 *Against Anarchy* investigates the function of Anarchism in Early Modernist political fiction The study explains how political novels from 1886 to 1911 narrate and evaluate the function of Anarchists as embodiments of a radical space beyond politics The literary prevalence of Anarchists has so far not been connected systematically to its literary and political functions The study addresses this research gap in detailed analyses of a radical theme in narratives by Joseph Conrad Henry James and G K Chesterton It shows that each novel presents strategies of demarcation that allow turn of the century Britain to project its cultural anxieties upon an imagined other the dreaded figure labelled Anarchist The political radical is set up as the foil against which comforting self descriptions can be maintained Rather than merely reproducing this boundary work however the novels also evaluate its function both for the respective political system and for their own narrative capabilities and present the consequences incurred by the loss of an anarchist outside *Against Anarchy* is a thorough cultural historiography of the politically other and marginal At the same time the study demonstrates that close attention to the specific literary image of Anarchism allows for a re evaluation of political thought beyond its immediate historical moment a literary political theory in its own right **Edwardian Bloomsbury** S.
