Handbook of Japanese Semantics and Pragmatics Wesley M. Jacobsen, Yukinori Takubo, 2020-10-12 The volume on Semantics and Pragmatics presents a collection of studies on linguistic meaning in Japanese either as conventionally encoded in linguistic form the field of semantics or as generated by the interaction of form with context the field of pragmatics representing a range of ideas and approaches that

are currently most influential in these fields. The studies are organized around a model that has long currency in traditional Japanese grammar whereby the linguistic clause consists of a multiply nested structure centered in a propositional core of objective meaning around which forms are deployed that express progressively more subjective meaning as one moves away from the core toward the periphery of the clause. The volume seeks to achieve a balance in highlighting both insights that semantic and pragmatic theory has to offer to the study of Japanese as a particular language and conversely contributions that Japanese has to make to semantic and pragmatic theory in areas of meaning that are either uniquely encoded or encoded to a higher degree of specificity in Japanese by comparison to other languages such as conditional forms expressing varying types of speaker modality and social deixis.

A Functional Discourse Grammar Theory of Grammaticalization Riccardo Giomi, 2023-01-30. Meaning change in grammaticalization has been variously described in terms of decreasing semantic weight and increasing generality, abstraction, intersubjectivity or discourse orientation. The author shows that all these trends are subsumed by the notion of scope increase along a precise hierarchy of semantic and pragmatic layers of grammatical organization such as endorsed by Functional Discourse Grammar. The scope increase hypothesis is immune from the exceptions and veritable counterexamples to all the aforementioned generalizations and has the decisive advantage of being more objectively measurable given its direct bearing on actual linguistic structure. The extremely rare exceptions to this generalization are also addressed and found to always result from a type of change independent from grammaticalization: the merger of two separate speech acts.

Nominalization in Asian Languages Foong Ha Yap, Karen Grunow-Härsta, Janick Wrona, 2011-06-29. Research on nominalization, a process that gives rise to referring expressions, has always played a central role in linguistic investigations. Over the years there has also been growing evidence that nominalization constructions often extend to non-referential domains. They participate in noun-modifying expressions e.g. genitive and relative clauses, subordinate clauses and topic constructions, finite structures with the nominalizers reanalyzed as TAM markers and stance constructions with evaluative, attitudinal, evidential and epistemic overtones. This volume brings together historical and crosslinguistic evidence from more than 20 different languages representing six different language families spanning the Asian continent and the Pacific and Indian oceans to elucidate the strategies and grammaticalization pathways that give rise to both referential and non-referential uses of nominalization constructions. This collection highlights the diversity of strategies and at the same time the robust cyclical nature of change within and across languages. The combined diachronic and typological analyses in this volume are particularly valuable for linguistic research on diachronic morphosyntax and linguistic universals and are also an important supplementary cross-referencing tool for linguistic investigations of versatile and ubiquitous morphemes in underdocumented languages.

By comparing nominal arguments in Nuosu Yi to those in Mandarin a well studied classifier language that has no overt evidence of an article determiner Jiang provides new accounts of variation among classifier languages and extends the parameters to argument formation in general

In addition to paying particular attention to these two classifier languages the discussion of nominal arguments also covers a wider range of classifier languages and number marking languages from Romance Germanic and Slavic to Hindi

lexicalization patterns Bartosz Wiland, 2019 Empirically the book covers two areas the morphosyntax of verbs and categories syncretic with the declarative complementizer in Slavic together with a comparative look at the similar categories in Latvian Baltic and Basa Bantu In the domain of verbs the book investigates a curious instance of analytic vs fusional realization of grammatical categories that we find in a semelfactive iterative alternation in Czech and Polish where a semelfactive verb stem such as in the Czech *kop n ou t* 'give a kick' alternates with an iterative verb stem as in *kop a t* 'kick repeatedly' The iterative *aj* stem is morphologically less complex than the semelfactive stem formed with the *n ou* sequence which is paradoxical given an analysis of iteratives as categories whose synsem representation is more complex than semelfactives In the domain of complementizers the book focuses on cross categorial paradigms that include an unexpected morphological containment in Russian a degree of morphological complexity in Latvian and an ABA pattern of syncretic alignment in Basa which we do not expect to find if syncretism is restricted to adjacent cells in a paradigm of Bobaljik 2012 Analytically the book focuses on the way the syntactic representations of these categories become realized as morphemes In the general sense then this contribution belongs to a growing body of work that investigates the relation between syntactic structure and morphological form understood as the amount of morphemes and their placement in particular the prefix vs suffix opposition More specifically however the approach to lexicalization taken up in this book is informed by the results of research on syntax in the last quarter of a century which show that syntactic representations are maximally fine grained the picture sometimes described as the one feature per one syntactic head dictum Such a scenario has led to the situation where syntactic representations can be submorphemic in the sense that a lexical item corresponds to more than one syntactic head a strand of research that has become known as Nanosyntax This book investigates the state of art methodology of Nanosyntax in resolving the selected empirical problems in the domain of Slavic verbs and declarative complementizers the problems that all appear to boil down to the way syntactic representations become realized as morphemes *Vietnamese-English Bilingualism* Ho-Dac Tuc, 2014-04-23 This book is concerned with three central issues the universality of constraints on code switching the nature of the relation between language contact and bilingualism and
