The Concept of Time in the Study of History Martin Heidegger, 2024-05-09 A modern translation of Heidegger's early work *The Concept of Time in the Study of History* original German title *Der Zeitbegriff in Der Geschichtswissenschaft* originally published in 1916 This edition contains a new afterword by the Translator a timeline of Heidegger's life and works a philosophic index of core Heideggerian concepts and a guide for terminology across 19th and 20th century Existentialists This translation is designed for readability and accessibility to Heidegger's enigmatic and dense philosophy Complex and specific philosophic terms are translated as literally as possible and academic footnotes have been removed to ensure easy reading Composed during Heidegger's habilitation phase at the University of Freiburg 1915 1916 this early text interrogates how historians conceptualize time a topic shaped by his mentors Heinrich Rickert and Emil Lask who sought to reconcile historical methodology with Neo Kantian epistemology Heidegger critiques historiographical objectivism the tendency to treat time as a linear sequence of now points stripped of lived experience For the young Heidegger influenced by Dilthey's hermeneutics and Husserl's nascent phenomenology historical time cannot be reduced to chronology it must account for the meaning structures that emerge from human agency and cultural context The work's framework remains indebted to Rickert's distinction between natural sciences generalizing and historical sciences individualizing but Heidegger strains against these limits hinting at his later existential notion of temporality Here time is not yet the ecstatic horizon of *Being and Time* 1927 but a vital temporal flow *Lebensstrom* that historical study must interpret hermeneutically Heidegger argues that historicity *Geschichtlichkeit* arises from the interplay of past present and future within human projects a proto phenomenological move rejecting positivist timelines Yet his language remains tethered to Neo Kantian terminology framing history as a science of meaning rather than a disclosure of Dasein's finite existence The text's significance lies in its negative space its failure to fully break from Rickert's formalism exposes the need for Heidegger's later ontological turn By 1927 this early vital flow becomes Dasein's care driven temporality but in 1916 the tools to dynamite historicism's foundations are still being forged in the shadow of Freiburg's academic orthodoxies
