Ulmer, 1994 In *Heuretics* a word defined as the branch of logic that treats the art of discovery or invention Gregory Ulmer sets forth new methods appropriate for conducting cultural studies research in an age of electronic hypermedia publisher **Heuretics** Gregory L.
