The Crosslinguistics of Zero-Marking of Spatial Relations Thomas Stolz, Sander Lestrade, Christel Stolz, 2014-07-28 On the basis of a world wide convenience sample of 116 languages the distribution of zero marking of spatial relations over the languages of the world is shown to largely escape any genetically areally and or typologically based constraints The main goal of this book is to firmly establish the cross linguistic occurrence of the zero marking of spatial relations and to provide a framework for its study in terms of economy and predictability

Ideophones Erhard Friedrich Karl Voeltz, Christa Kilian-Hatz, 2001-01-01 The present volume represents a selection of papers presented

Spatial Interrogatives in Europe and Beyond Thomas Stolz, Nataliya Levkovych, Aina Urdze, Julia Nintemann, Maja Robbers, 2017-08-07 The extant generalizations about the grammar of space rely heavily on the analyses of declarative sentences There is a need to check whether these generalizations also hold in the domain of interrogation To this end this book analyzes data from some 450 languages including non standard varieties The focus is on paradigms of spatial interrogatives such as English where whither and whence and their internal organization These paradigms are checked for recurrent patterns of morphological mismatches such as syncretism and different degrees of complexity e g the number of segments The data base consists of a large parallel literary corpus *Le petit prince* and translations thereof which is complemented by further sources of information such as descriptive grammars The data are analyzed from a synchronic perspective However diachronic issues are addressed unsystematically too It is shown that the distribution of phenomena which characterize paradigms of spatial interrogatives are subject to areal linguistic factors This is the first typological study of spatial interrogatives It provides new insights for students of the grammar of space morphological paradigms and language typology

Yearbook of Morphology 2003 G.E. Booij, Jaap van Marle, 2007-11-23 A revival of interest in morphology has occurred during recent years The Yearbook of Morphology series published since 1988 has proven to be an eminent support for this upswing of morphological research

since it contains articles on topics which are central in the current theoretical debates and which are frequently referred to. Thus it has set a standard for morphological research. In the Yearbook of Morphology 2003 a large number of articles is devoted to the phenomenon of complex predicates consisting of a verb preceded by a preverb. Such complex predicates exhibit both morphological and syntactic behaviour and thus form a testing ground for theories of the relation between morphology and syntax. Evidence is presented from a wide variety of languages including Germanic, Romance, Australian and Uralic languages. A number of articles present historical evidence on the change of preverbal elements into prefixes. Topics such as grammaticalization, constructional idioms and derivational periphrasis are also discussed. In addition, this Yearbook of Morphology contains articles on morphological parsing and on the role of paradigmatic relations in analogical change.

Murrinhpatha Morphology and Phonology John Mansfield, 2019-04-01. Murrinhpatha is an Australian Aboriginal language spoken in a region of tropical savannah and tidal inlets on the north coast of the continent. Some 3000 speakers live mostly in the towns of Wadeye and Nganmarriyanga, though they maintain close ties to their traditional lands, totems and spirit ancestors. Murrinhpatha word structure is highly complex and quite distinct from the better known Pama-Nyungan languages of central and southern Australia. Murrinhpatha is characterised by prolific compounding, clitic clusters, cumulative inflection, irregular allomorphy and phonological assimilation. This book provides a comprehensive account of these phenomena, giving particular attention to questions of morphological constituency, lexical storage and whether there is really such thing as a word unit.

Proto-Australian Mark Harvey, Robert Mailhammer, 2024-08-19. This book is the first full evaluation of the Proto-Australian hypothesis which proposes that most Australian languages have a common ancestor, Proto-Australian (PA). Using the standard methodologies of historical linguistics, the authors show that nearly all Australian languages descend from PA. Given that PA was a single language, it was spoken only in a small area of Australia. Its descendants have spread across the continent. Current theories of language spread do not offer clear motivations for large-scale spread in hunter-gatherer economies. This raises significant questions for analyses of Australian prehistory and archaeology, specifically and more widely for general theories of hunter-gatherer prehistory and language spread.

Noun Phrases in Australian Languages Dana Louagie, 2019-11-18. This book presents a first comprehensive typological analysis of noun phrases in Australian languages, covering the domains of classification, qualification, quantification, determination and constituency. The analysis is based on a representative sample of 100 languages. Among other points, the results call into question the classic idea that Australian languages tend to lack phrasal structures in the nominal domain, with over two-thirds of the languages showing evidence for phrasehood. Moreover, it is argued that it may be more interesting to typologise languages on the basis of where and how they allow phrasal structure, rather than on the basis of a yes/no answer to the question of constituency. The analysis also shows that a determiner slot can be identified in about half of the languages, even though they generally lack classic determiner features like obligatory use in particular contexts or a restriction to one determiner per NP. Special attention is

given to elements which can be used both inside and beyond determiner slots demonstrating how part of speech and functional structure do not always align The book is of interest to researchers documenting Australian languages as well as to typologists and theorists

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
