Although he worked briefly as a reporter in New York, it was in the Salinas Valley that he spent the Depression years, and his experiences and the people he met became the basis for his books. *Of Mice and Men* opened the eyes of the public to the desperate lives of the migrant workers. *The Grapes of Wrath* told the story of the destitute Oklahoma dust bowl farmers who flocked to the Valley in search of work. *Cannery Row* painted the rough and tumble lives of the cannery workers in nearby Monterey. And *East of Eden*, his most personal novel, revolved around the lives of two families from the Valley whose story was a tragic metaphor for the suffering humans needlessly cause one another.
