Hobson, 2012-10-18 In Body as Evidence Janell Hobson challenges postmodernist dismissals of identity politics and the delusional belief that the Millennial era reflects a postracial and postfeminist world Hobson points to diverse examples in cultural narratives which suggest that new media rely on old ideologies in the shaping of the body politic Body as Evidence creates a theoretical mash up of prose and poetry to illuminate the ways that bodies still matter as sites of political cultural and digital resistance It does so by examining various representations from popular shows like American Idol to public figures like the Obamas to high profile cases like the Duke lacrosse rape scandal to current trends in digital culture Hobson's study also discusses the women who have fueled and retooled twenty first century media to make sense of antiracist and feminist resistance Her discussions include the electronica of Janelle Monáe and Beyoncé the feminist film odysseys of Wanuri Kahiu and Neloufer Pazira and the embodied resistance found simply in raising one's voice in song creating a blog wearing a veil stripping naked or planting a tree Spinning knowledge out of this information overload Hobson offers a global black feminist meditation on how our bodies mobilize destabilize and decolonize the meanings of race and gender in an increasingly digitized and globalized world

beliefs about the process and purpose of the American republic book jacket **Philadelphia Stories** Samuel Otter, 2013-01-02 In *Philadelphia Stories* Samuel Otter finds literary value historical significance and political urgency in a sequence of texts written in and about Philadelphia between the Constitution and the Civil War Historians such as Gary B Nash and Julie Winch have chronicled the distinctive social and political space of early national Philadelphia Yet while individual writers such as Charles Brockden Brown Edgar Allan Poe and George Lippard have been linked to Philadelphia no sustained attempt has been made to understand these figures and many others as writing in a tradition tied to the city's history The site of William Penn's Holy Experiment in religious toleration and representative government and of national Declaration and Constitution near the border between slavery and freedom Philadelphia was home to one of the largest and most influential free African American communities in the United States The city was seen by residents and observers as the laboratory for a social experiment with international consequences Philadelphia would be the stage on which racial character would be tested and a possible future for the United States after slavery would be played out It would be the arena in which various residents would or would not demonstrate their capacities to participate in the nation's civic and political life Otter argues that the Philadelphia experiment the term used in the nineteenth century produced a largely unacknowledged literary tradition of peculiar forms and intensities in which verbal performance and social behavior assumed the weight of race and nation

Remixing the Civil War Thomas J. Brown, 2011-11-15 In 1961 the historian and poet Robert Penn Warren remarked that the Civil War is for the American imagination the great single event of our history This volume reconsiders whether fifty years later Warren's claim still holds true Essays from specialists in art literature and history examine how contemporary culture represents and interprets the Civil War They look at the works of more than thirty artists and writers as well as multiple movements political and social to reveal the many and provocative ways in which Americans engage the Civil War today The book includes chapters on the place of Abraham Lincoln in Barack Obama's presidential campaign controversies over the symbolism of the Confederate flag and the proliferation of Juneteenth observances *Remixing the Civil War* pays special attention to the works of African Americans and white southerners for whom the Civil War was a revolutionary and defining moment Such prominent scholars as Robert H Brinkmeyer Jr W Fitzhugh Brundage Kirk Savage and Elizabeth Young explore the works of major artists and lesser known figures including Bobbie Ann Mason Kara Walker Dario Robleto and John Huddleston The authors find that Americans today openly and playfully manipulate familiar images of the Civil War to explore the malleability and permeability of traditional social categories like national identity gender and race This collection continues the conversation Warren began fifty years

Shame and Sexuality Claire Pajaczkowska, Ivan Ward, 2014-02-25 Why do human beings feel shame? What is the cultural dimension of shame and sexuality? Can theory understand the power of affect? How is psychoanalysis integral to cultural theory? The experience of shame is a profound, painful and universal emotion with lasting effects on many aspects of public life and human culture. Rooted in childhood experience, linked to sexuality and the cultural norms which regulate the body and its pleasures, shame is uniquely human. *Shame and Sexuality* explores elements of shame in human psychology and the cultures of art, film, photography and textiles. Abstractionist Aesthetics Phillip Brian Harper, 2015-12-25 An artistic discussion on the critical potential of African American expressive culture. In a major reassessment of African American culture, Phillip Brian Harper intervenes in the ongoing debate about the proper depiction of black people. He advocates for African American aesthetic abstractionism, a representational mode whereby an artwork, rather than striving for realist verisimilitude, vigorously asserts its essentially artificial character. Maintaining that realist representation reaffirms the very social facts that it might have been understood to challenge, Harper contends that abstractionism shows up the actual constructedness of those facts, thereby subjecting them to critical scrutiny and making them amenable to transformation. Arguing against the need for positive representations, *Abstractionist Aesthetics* displaces realism as the primary mode of African American representational aesthetics, re-centers literature as a principal site of African American cultural politics and elevates experimental prose within the domain of African American literature. Drawing on examples across a variety of artistic production, including the visual work of Fred Wilson and Kara Walker, the music of Billie Holiday and Cecil Taylor, and the prose and verse writings of Ntozake Shange, Alice Walker and John Keene, this book poses urgent questions about how racial blackness is made to assume certain social meanings. In the process, African American aesthetics are upended, rendering abstractionism as the most powerful modality for Black representation.
