Dürer and Beyond Stijn Alsteens, Freyda Spira, 2012 This exhibition is the first to offer an extensive overview of the Museum's holdings of early Central European drawings many of which were acquired in the last two decades An emphasis on works by later sixteenth and seventeenth century artists is balanced by a selection of German drawings from the fifteenth and earlier sixteenth century of which some of the most exceptional ones including works by Albrecht Dürer entered the Museum with The Robert Lehman Collection in 1975 Publisher's website *Creating Conversos* Roger Louis Martínez-Dávila, 2018-04-30 In *Creating Conversos* Roger Louis Martínez-Dávila skillfully unravels the complex story of Jews who converted to Catholicism in Spain between the fourteenth and sixteenth centuries migrated to colonial Mexico and Bolivia during the conquest of the Americas and assumed prominent church and government positions Rather than acting as alienated and marginalized subjects the conversos were able to craft new identities and strategies not just for survival but for prospering in the most adverse circumstances Martínez-Dávila provides an extensive elaborately detailed case study of the Carvajal Santa Mar a clan from its beginnings in late fourteenth century Castile By tracing the family ties and intermarriages of the Jewish rabbinic ha Levi lineage of Burgos Spain which became the converso Santa Mar a clan with the Old Christian Carvajal line of Plasencia Spain Martínez-Dávila demonstrates the family's changing identity and how the monolithic notions of ethnic and religious disposition were broken down by the group and negotiated anew as they transformed themselves from marginal into mainstream characters at the center of the economies of power in the world they inhabited They succeeded in rising to the pinnacles of power within the church hierarchy in Spain even to the point of contesting the succession to the papacy and overseeing the Inquisitorial investigation and execution of extended family members including Luis de Carvajal The Younger and most of his immediate family during the 1590s in Mexico City Martínez-Dávila offers a rich panorama of the many forces that shaped the emergence of modern Spain including tax policies rivalries among the nobility and ecclesiastical politics The extensive genealogical research enriches the historical reconstruction filling in gaps and illuminating contradictions in standard contemporary narratives His text is strengthened by many family trees that assist the reader as the threads of political and social relationships are carefully disentangled **The Roman Monster** Lawrence Buck, 2014-03-01 In December 1495 the Tiber River flooded the city of Rome causing extensive drowning and destruction When the water finally receded a rumor began to circulate that a grotesque monstrosity had been discovered in the muddy detritus the Roman monster The creature itself is inherently fascinating consisting of an eclectic combination of human and animal body parts The symbolism of these elements the interpretations that religious controversialists read into them and the history of the image itself help to document antipapal polemics from fifteenth century Rome to the Elizabethan religious settlement This study examines the iconography of the image of the Roman monster and offers ideological reasons for associating the image with the pre Reformation Waldensians and Bohemian Brethren It accounts for the reproduction and

survival of the monster's image in fifteenth century Bohemia and provides historical background on the topos of the papal Antichrist a concept that Philip Melanchthon associated with the monster. It contextualizes Melanchthon's tract *The Pope Ass Explained* within the first five years of the Lutheran movement and it documents the popularity of the Roman monster within the polemical and apocalyptic writings of the Reformation. This is a careful examination and interpretation of all relevant primary documents and secondary historical literature in telling the story of the origins and impact of the most famous monstrous portent of the Reformation era. *The Illustrated Bartsch* Walter L. Giovan Pietro Bellori: *The Lives of the Modern Painters, Sculptors and Architects* Giovanni Pietro Bellori, Hellmut Wohl, 2005-11-21 This is the first complete translation of the biographies of fifteen artists including Annibale Carracci, Caravaggio, Rubens, Van Dyck and Poussin written by the seventeenth century antiquarian Giovan Pietro Bellori. Originally conceived as a continuation of Vasari's famous *Lives*, it is a fundamental source for seventeenth century Italian art and artistic theory providing detailed descriptions of extant and lost works of art while casting light on the cultural politics of contemporary Rome and the relations between Rome and France. The importance of Bellori's *Lives* lies in the scrupulous documentation of artists many of whom he knew personally; the author's detailed descriptions of their works and his exposition of the classicist theory of art in the introductory lecture *the Idea*. Aretino's Satyr Raymond B. Waddington, 2004-01-01 Pietro Aretino's literary influence was felt throughout most of Europe during the sixteenth century yet English language criticism of this writer's work and persona has hitherto been sparse Raymond B Waddington's study redresses this oversight drawing together literary and visual arts criticism in its examination of Aretino's carefully cultivated scandalous persona a persona created through his writings his behaviour and through a wide variety of visual arts and crafts In the Renaissance it was believed that satire originated from satyrs The satirist Aretino promoted himself as a satyr the natural being whose sexuality guarantees its truthfulness Waddington shows how Aretino's own construction of his public identity came to eclipse the value of his writings causing him to be denigrated as a pornographer and blackmailer Arguing that Aretino's deployment of an artistic network for self promotional ends was so successful that for a period his face was possibly the most famous in Western Europe Waddington also defends Aretino describing his involvement in the larger sphere of the production and promotion of the visual arts of the period Aretino's Satyr is richly illustrated with examples of the visual media used by the writer to create his persona These include portraits by major artists and *arti minori* engravings portrait medals and woodcuts

Wood, 2020-04-14 A reconsideration of the problem of time in the Renaissance examining the complex and layered temporalities of Renaissance images and artifacts In this widely anticipated book two leading contemporary art historians offer a subtle and profound reconsideration of the problem of time in the Renaissance Alexander Nagel and Christopher Wood examine the meanings uses and effects of chronologies models of temporality and notions of originality and repetition in Renaissance images and artifacts *Anachronic Renaissance* reveals a web of paths traveled by works and artists a landscape obscured by art history's disciplinary compulsion to anchor its data securely in time The buildings paintings drawings prints sculptures and medals discussed were shaped by concerns about authenticity about reference to prestigious origins and precedents and about the implications of transposition from one medium to another Byzantine icons taken to be Early Christian antiquities the *acheiropoieton* or image made without hands the activities of spoliation and citation differing approaches to art restoration legends about movable buildings and forgeries and pastiches all of these emerge as basic conceptual structures of Renaissance art Although a work of art does bear witness to the moment of its fabrication Nagel and Wood argue that it is equally important to understand its temporal instability how it
